Participation by residents also set a record.

The average check for full-time employees increased from \$1,071 to \$1,238. The average check for part-time employees increased from \$321 to \$405. The highest check for full-time employees (based on length of service) increased from \$1,521 to \$1,777. In all, a very good year!
