SPOTLIGHT: LOCAL RADIO BENEFIT WEEKEND



For years, radio stations have supported musicians, but this weekend the tables have turned, and local musicians are coming together to lend their talents to support two local radio stations.

This Friday and Saturday night at Cat's Cradle, a menagerie of bands will gather for a benefit for UNC's student radio station, WXYC, and Carrboro community radio station WCOM.

On the schedule for Friday night is a Bluegrass Jam with local favorites Big Fat Gap and Mason's Apron. The show bill also notes additional "friends," so get ready for a stage filled with talent and local celebrities.

Saturday night's lineup is stacked with Free Electric State, Lizzy Ross, Wylie Hunter & The Cazadores, John Howie Jr. and the Rosewood Bluff and New Town Drunks

Tickets are a suggested donation of \$5 per night, or you can opt for a weekend pass for \$8. Doors open at 8 p.m. and the shows start at 8:30 each night.

Sacrificial Poets member CJ Suitt said as the crowd prepared to take to the streets for a march to the First Baptist Church on North Roberson Street for a service.

Rally-goers eagerly took to the pavement of Franklin Street, singing "Marching up to Freedom Land" and "We Shall Overcome," and as their bodies found warmth, their voices grew louder, chanting "Fired up and ready to go."

The diverse crowd then poured into the church, packing the pews, as regular churchgoers sat beside the non-religious and social activists shared space with police chiefs and local and state politicians.

The crowd was greeted by a powerful speech from Michelle Laws, the president emeritus of the Chapel Hill-Carrboro NAACP.

We are here to recommit ourselves to the fight for social justice," Laws told the crowd in a strong and amplified voice. "Welcome to the struggle newcomers; welcome to the fight."

The keynote speaker for the day was state Rep. Larry D. Hall, who spoke about poverty, the Northside community and education.

Hall referenced King's vision to end poverty for all races, but lamented the fact that while we have more resources to fight poverty today than in King's time, the epidemic is worse now than then.

Hall also talked about the need for citizens to make certain the people they elected to represent them are acting in accordance with the needs of the community, saying, "I am an elected official, but you are the leaders."

"This is the first day we can be what we want to be," Hall said, encouraging those assembled to use this day to set the tone for their vear.

"We all can be great because we all can serve."
