With over 30 restaurants downtown, there's a lot to choose from. Here are some of the top picks among students.

Top of the Hill Restaurant

With an outdoor patio overlooking Franklin Street, Top of the Hill Restaurant is a popular destination for students.

"We bring an environment that makes all walks of life comfortable," said floor manager Steven Torchio. "Anyone from a professor to an undergrad to a blue-collar worker, we have something for everyone."

110 N. Columbia St. location. But what really draws students in, Thirakoun said, is the restaurant's "secret special shrimp sauce."


You'll have try it for yourself and come back for more, like the majority of Sakura customers. Thirakoun won't be sharing his
