Clown botches first congress vote

clown elected to Brazilian Congress has stayed true to his profession, botching his first vote by pressing the wrong button Wednesday.

Francisco Everardo Oliveira Silva, who goes by his clown name "Tiririca," had pledged to vote for a proposal for a new minimum wage.

But during the vote, he pressed the wrong button on the computerized system, accidentally casting a vote for a much higher wage increase. The proposal he wanted still won

Tiririca, a clown, singer and comedian, won a congressional seat in landslide fashion in 2010 after running on an "It can't get any worse" platform and promising nothing more than to report how politicians spent their free time.

He caught the attention of disillusioned voters, and received the second-most votes in Brazilian history.
