Another student, Harvey Danjels, stated "from a constitutional aspect the rights are very clear. But when you consider the general attitudes and practices in the South it is stupid to raise a point which can bring only friction, a crussede of going about and raising such questions, cannot be merely trying to bring about reconciliation.
