

Tobias Lyerly - Last Native Confedereate Veteran

Rowan County lost its last native Confederate veteran this morning, February 22, 1946, at 7 o'clock when Tobias Lyerly died at the home of a daughter, Mrs. R.B. Peeler, in Granite Quarry. Mr. Lyerly suffered a severe fall about two weeks ago and became seriously ill. He failed to rally. Mr. Lyerly was the only native son surviving who took part in the Civil War.

Tobias Lyerly was born in Rowan County November 10, 1946, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Zachariah Lyerly. His mother, Rachael Boger, died while he was young. Zachariah and Rachael's marriage bond is dated 12 October 1833. Tobias had four sisters, all of whom are dead.

"Uncle Tobe," as he was known, joined the Confederate army when he was 18 years old, serving with Company B, Junior Reserve, Second Regiment. His stories of his fighting fearless captain have thrilled the young generations since. Last November 10, when he celebrated his 99th birthday quietly at home, he still retained the martial spirit of the early 60s, as he vowed he would have gone to war with the boys in the 1940s if he had been allowed to go. However, he was firm in the belief that all wars are unnecessary, brought on by selfish interests, for gains in wealth and power, with the poor man doing the heavy fighting.

For years "Uncle Tobe" had be a familiar figure as he took his daily walks to his grandson's service station and his son's home and other points about Granite Quarry. For a number of years he was unable to visit Salisbury, due to the excitement of such short trips working against his physical welfare. His eyesight was poor and his hearing was almost gone the last few years, making it hard for others to talk to him, but he took a keen interest in the recent war, later checking up on each Granite Quarry service man as they came home with honorable discharges. He was greatly thrilled when the Daughters of the Confederacy presented him their Bronze Cross.

He was married September 3, 1869 to Margaret Ann Miller. Mrs. Margaret Miller Lyerly died April 11, 1939. Mr. Tobias Lyerly was survived by a son, J.H.A.Lyerly of Granite Quarry, two daughters, Mrs. R.B. Peeler and Mrs. J.H. Peeler of Salisbury, 12 grandchildren, 23 great-grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

FOOTNOTES OF HISTORY

Dashing Confederate Names

Colorful names, often down right threatening, adorned the names of local companies enlisted at the beginning of the war in 1861. Among those stationed at Raleigh on June 20, 1861, were the Haywood Rangers, Polk County Volunteers, Madison Light Infantry, Buncombe Sharp Shooters, Black Mountain Boys, Rough and Ready Boys, Burke Tigers, and the Jefferson Davis Guards. By this date, Rowan had in the field three companies totaling 400 men and two more companies nearly completed.

Among those preparing to join others already in Virginia were the Scotch-Ireland Greys under Capt. Wood. Of this company the editor of The Carolina Watchman said: "It comprises many of the descendants of that indomitable stock of Scots - who during the Revolution made Rowan one of the hottest regions invaded by the British." "They are intelligent, God fearing, law abiding, patriotic citizens," and, he continued, "they were once union loving, conservative Whigs of the Henry Clay school - who stood firm in their faith and integrity to the last moment." "Lincoln's Proclamation." he concluded, "converted them into rebels."

The Scotch-Ireland Greys trained at their encampment at Rowan Mills (near present-day Cleveland). Response to the colors was so surprising that the state's military authorities ceased to accept any more twelve month volunteers by June 27. Only those were taken who volunteered for the duration of the war in order to fill the requisition for the ten thousand state troops authorized by the governor.

Meanwhile the state legislature winding up the business of the special session appointed Burton Craige of Salisbury as a delegate to the Confederate Congress, then meeting in Montgomery, Alabama. The state called for any person having arms or "accounterments" belonging to the state to forward them to the office of the Adjutant Brevent in Salisbury.

At the old factory lot in a beautiful oak grove in southeast Salisbury the 63rd Regiment held regular drills. This factory later became the infamous Confederate prison. Inventors of every description were busy at work devising new and more terrible instruments of war. In Salem T.F. Christian invented a gun which was capable of throwing 144 balls at one firing and 1,008 per minute. "It is said to be a terrible weapon," commented the Watchman, "and can be worked by a boy of 10 or 12 years of age." This prototype of the modern machine gun was put on exhibition in Raleigh.

III. MYSTERIES AND CURIOSITIES


Natural Wall

A mystery and a curiosity have intrigued Rowan Countians for many years. One is the subterranean wall uncovered by a freshet in 1794, and the other concerns a Third Creek schoolteacher who many believe was the great Michel Ney, marshal of France and Napoleon's chief lieutenant.

The construction of the wall located in the Pot Neck community near Second Creek is peculiar in that the stones are laid in courses with precision and well fitted in the joints and even on the side walls. The stones vary in size and shape from three fourths of an inch to five inches across the end and some extend sixteen inches in length. Some of the stones are long and slim while others are broad and thick, but all seem to fit into the wall with ease and symmetry.

The whole is apparently fastened together with a sort of putty-like cement, brown, white, and black in color. The ends of the stones form the sides of the wall and the outside stones appear to have been placed but the middle stones seem to have been thrown in. The wall itself has been explored for a distance of about 300 feet and found to be uniform in shape, being 22 inches wide at the top and slightly wider at the bottom, 12 to 14 feet high and running in a southeast direction. Nor is this the only wall. A short distance away there are two similar walls but they have not been so extensively explored.

This strange phenomenon was first reported by the Reverend James Hall, founder of Clio's

Nursery, a classical school operated in the late eighteenth century. Hall reported:

has been discovered which has engaged the attention of the curious. During the heavy rains which fell in the summer of 1794 a cavern was formed in the side of a hill near a small stream. The hill is between two and three poles in surface where the cavern is formed about the middle of which stands a subterranean wall composed of small stones laid in white cement resembling Lime of a very fine texture.

About the same time the Reverend Carl Storch, minister at Organ Church, reported the finding to Professor Velthusen in Germany in 1796. He wrote that "a most peculiar discovery was made in our section and may prove important for the history of this part of the country, suggesting that this wall was the work of some ancient mound builders."

Geographies of the early 1800s carried references to this wall. Daniel Adams's geography book printed in 1816 called it "a remarkable subterraneous wall of stone," laid in cement. "When built, by whom and for what purpose," he surmised, "is left wholly to conjecture."

Strother's map made in 1808 places the wall in the Pot Neck section near Second Creek. Subsequent maps copied Strother's by designating the mysterious wall in bold outline.

William Guthrie's geography book printed in 1809 called it a "curious subterranean wall," which when first discovered, "was supposed to have been a work of art." He concluded, however, that "subsequent observation has determined it to be a natural production of basalt."

The Reverend Jethro Rumple, in his History of Rowan County (1881), said that the wall was nothing more than trap dikes or a natural wall of trap rock that gives the appearance of being laid in cement. This "cement," he explained, is a fine decomposition of the trap rock itself or an infiltration of fine material from without.

Legends surrounding the wall, however, refuse to die. There has been a certain amount of superstition about the "bottomless pits" in the ground at the point where the wall passes through the small declivity, now filled up by the roots of nearby trees. One old native some years ago recalled the story told in his boyhood about the Indian city and temple and the annual

religious festivities at which a sacrificial maiden was flung into the bowels of the earth to be digested in order that crops might prosper and game be abundant.

At other times 'possum hunters have heard strange sounds emanating from the direction of the wall, and sometimes lights seem to move around the branch. Bullfrogs dance in the water and croak. It is a screech owls' heaven.

Peter Stuart Ney


One of a succession of teachers at Third Creek Presbyterian Church near Cleveland was one who might properly be termed "the enigma of Third Creek." Known locally as Peter Stuart Ney, he was thought by many to be Marshal Michel Ney of France, who had been Napoleon's ablest general and who had supposedly been killed by a firing squad on order of the Bourbon reactionaries restored to power after Napoleon's defeat at Waterloo. This simple schoolmaster denied any such connection with Napoleon except when he became intoxicated. On these infrequent occasions he proclaimed that he was, indeed, the Duke of Elchingen, Prince of Moskowa, and one of Bonaparte's most trusted lieutanants. When sober, he preferred to be only an honest teacher from Scotland.

The story of this strange man's adventures as told by those who believe him to have been Marshal Ney is briefly this: he was supposedly shot by a firing squad made up of his former soldiers in Paris in December, 1815, but his loyal men deliberately missed him and other friends slipped him aboard a craft bound from Bordeaux for Charleston, South Carolina. While on board ship Ney was recognized by a former soldier, and after reaching Charleston in January, 1816, he was accosted by another comrade. Leaving Charleston, Ney made his way to Cheraw, then to Florence,

where he secured a situation as schoolteacher to Col. Benjamin Rogers's family and friends. He stayed there until one of the colonel's small children brought him a newspaper with the report of Napoleon's death. That night Ney slashed his throat and for the next two days during his delirium he raved about Napoleon, campaigns, battles, and high-placed personages with a familiarity that startled his attendants. After recovering, he left Florence and settled in one community after another until in 1829 he arrived in Virginia; for the next two years Ney was employed by William Nelson in Mecklenburg County. In 1831 for reasons unknown Ney moved again, this time to Third Creek Church in Rowan County where he lived until his death in 1846.

Dr. B. D. Wood, who attended Ney during his last moments, bent over the dying teacher and pointedly asked him if he was really Marshal Ney. The weak and dying man reportedly told Dr. Wood in the presence of witnesses, "I will not die with a lie on my lips; I am Marshal Ney of France."

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
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


Early Landowners of Rowan County

Rowan Public Library, the Edith M. Clark History Room, and the Genealogical Society of Rowan County are proud to announce that the Early Landowners of Rowan County maps, along with the index, have been digitized and published to the History Room website as our newest digital collection.

In 1995, James W. "Bill" Kluttz published a set of 6 maps that indicated the earliest land purchases in the area of North Carolina we now identify as Rowan County. While Rowan County in 1753 covered a much greater area than its current acreage, the maps feature only the land plats in the area that is currently Rowan. The Early Landowners of Rowan County, North Carolina maps, also known as the Kluttz Maps, originated in the work done in 1950s by David Rendleman. In his research, Kluttz also included portions of western Rowan that had not been previously incorporated in any plat map studies. Listed on each map within the property lines are the deed book and page number of the earliest deed reference as well as the grantor, grantee, and date of the sale. There are 1,200 names within the grantor/grantee lists. The Kluttz maps are invaluable for genealogical research in this area. These maps are accessible online by entering the History and Genealogy section of the library website, then the Edith M. Clark History Room link, click on the drop down menu for "Collections" and select the Kluttz maps or the Kluttz map index to explore for specific surnames.

A set of 6 maps and the index to the map can be purchased through the Genealogical Society for \$35.00. Sets are also available for viewing or purchase at the Rowan Public Library History Room. The deed abstracts and deeds on microfilm may also be accessed in the History Room.
