African leader may drop rap album

Ugandan President Yoweri Museveni achieved Bill Clinton-like coolness when a rap he performed became a smash hit on the radio and in nightclubs across the country.

Now, the leader of the African nation is approaching Theodore Roosevelt levels of street cred after saying he might drop an album.

Museveni, who is running for reelection today, performed two children's folk chants at election rallies during the campaign season. Record producers then mixed the rhythmic chants with a hip-hop beat and clips from his speeches.

"Today these young people taught me about this 'rap,'" the president says before spitting hot fire. "Well, I can even give you some rap myself."
