COMEDY FESTIVAL CONTINUES TO GROW

DSI Theater wanted to get the word out early that the 10th anniversary of the North Carolina Comedy Arts Festival (formerly the Dirty South Improv festival) will be held on an even grander scale than in previous years.

Zach Ward, owner of DSI and driving force behind the festival, said though the economy is down, the comedy sector keeps growing.

"People always want to laugh," he said. That's part of the reason next year's festival will include an additional week and welcome sketch-comedy teams and film and video to its line-up.

The festival runs Feb. 4-27. Local come-

dians and national acts will perform in the month-long celebration of comedy, with performances at the DSI Theater, Cat's Cradle and The ArtsCenter.

Ward said he also hopes to expand to different venues in Raleigh and Durham.

Submissions from comedians will be accepted from Sept. 1 to Nov. 1, and Ward personally views each digital copy in selecting the lineup.

Only online submissions will be viewed, and Ward said he looks favorably on performances in raw form.
