Though I do not know who did nominate me for the award, I am beyond honored and esteemed to have received such an honor and thank those individuals publically. It has been nothing but blessings this year as Miss Haliwa-Saponi and I definitely have discovered a part of myself this year that I never knew existed!

<u> Hkikle' Ma:Pa "Awakening the Spirit" Project</u>

Hkikle' Ma:Pa means Awakening the Spirit in the Tutelo-Saponi language and is the name of a youth cultural awareness project sponsored by Haliwa-Saponi Youth Initiative, Historic Legacy Project, and Youth Cultural Programs. With support from the First Nations Development Institute Native Youth & Culture Fund, we are able to work one-on-one with tribal youth and elders to share and preserve traditional, cultural, and spiritual practices. The project is intended to serve at least 20 youth ages 13-19 and will teach these youth essential knowledge, history, and skills to carry-on the heritage of our people. The project began in October with the first youth and elder Talking Circle where over 35 people attended. We held a leather pouch-making class on December 14th for youth and elders with 27 participants. By January 2018, 24 youth were ready to commit to going through a traditional Coming of Age process. The group is led by Senora and Dalton Lynch with support from tribal staff Dr. Marvin Richardson, Sharon Berrun, and Consuela Richardson, as well as parent volunteers Stacey and Lucas Lynch. The group meets each Thursday for learning workshops and elder talking circle sessions will begin in March.

Native Youth Initiative Supports College Readiness Program

College and career readiness is a major focal point of the Office of Indian Education's Native Youth Community Projects. The Initiative's Annual Performance Reports in the last two years showed that Haliwa-Saponi youth were not enrolling in advanced courses at the level of other student populations, but that number has increased as students in the Warren County Indian Education Program are taking advantage of advanced courses offered at their high schools. A study of the Haliwa-Saponi Tribal School three years ago revealed that no students were taking advanced courses, a trend that had remained unchanged until the 2017-2018 academic year. This summer, Rev. Michael Richardson (School Board/Tribal Council Chairman), Mr. Warren Bell (Administrator), and Consuela Richardson (Project Manager) formed a partnership with Vance-Granville Community College to enroll students in the College and Career Promise. The College & Career Promise is a high school-to-career program that allows high



school students to enroll in courses at the community college at no tuition cost to the students. This fall, seven students enrolled in CIS 110 (Intro to Computers). A partnership was also formed with Nash Community College for the spring semester to expand the student's options. This spring, seven students enrolled in many different courses ranging from Business and Criminal Justice to College Math and English. Two of these students will graduate this June with a total of 12 college transfer credits. With support from the Native Youth Initiative, seven students have enrolled in a total of 19 courses for college transfer credit and has provided over \$1,400.00 of financial support for books.

Aims is a free week long summer program with the Wake Forest School of Medicine in Winston Salem, NC on June 24-29, 2018. AIMS will give you the opportunity to participate in hands on health and biomedical simulation, learn more about health science careers, and prepare you to apply to college. IRS Encourages Native Americans to Check Eligibility for Earned Income Tax Credit

The IRS urges Native American taxpayers to check if they qualify for the earned income tax credit since many workers in Tribal communities often overlook this credit. EITC benefits Native Americans who meet basic rules. Taxpayers must have income from a job, be self-employed, or run their own business. This includes home-based businesses and work in the service industry, construction, and farming. By law, the IRS cannot issue refunds before mid-February for tax returns that claim the EITC or the additional child tax credit. The law requires the IRS to hold the entire refund — even the portion not associated with the EITC or ACTC. The IRS expects the earliest EITC/ACTC related refunds to be available in taxpayer bank accounts or on debit cards starting Feb. 27, 2018, if these taxpayers choose direct deposit and there are no other issues with their tax return.

February is Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month

The North Carolina Coalition Against Domestic Violence continues our efforts to end intimate partner violence by sharing resources and information with domestic violence service providers, allied professionals and other support systems to teen survivors of dating violence. Evidence has shown that the severity of intimate partner violence increases in cases where the pattern of abuse began in adolescence. Therefore, NCCADV will embark on a mission to circulate resources, informative media and other related information to address teen dating violence during the month of February.
