

BOAT-IN CAMPGROUND NEARS COMPLETION

The staff at Lake James State Park has been working feverishly over the winter on its latest major project – 30 boat-in campsites on Long Arm Peninsula. The construction of these sites is the fulfillment of a longstanding desire from the people of Burke County who remember the days when lakeside camping was a popular weekend activity. In fact, when the Paddy's Creek Area was purchased by the state in 2005, a survey of potential users in the community listed boat-in camping as their most-wanted recreational opportunity.

The dimensions of each campsite is 16X24 feet, enough for a family-sized tent, and includes a picnic table, food

locker and fire pit for grilling and keeping warm. Also included is a fantastic view of the Linville side of Lake James. The boat-in campground is divided into three areas, each consisting of between 9 and 12 primitive campsites with immediate access to men's and women's toilet facilities. There will be no public access to the area by land. There will not be electricity, water or refuse receptacles available. Like the current campground facility at the Catawba River Area, all state park rules and regulations will apply to the new area.

"We have been focusing on completion of these sites for several months," said Park Superintendent Nora Coffey. "Boat-in camping has been on the park's Master Plan since the inception of the Paddy's Creek Area and we are really excited to be on the verge of making it a reality. I have no doubt these sites are going to be extremely popular, especially among area residents who have fond memories of shoreline camping at the lake before it was developed."

When opened sometime during the 2015 camping season, the sites will be available by reservation only through the park system reservation hotline at 1-877-722-6762. Stay tuned to local news media outlets for information on when boat-in camping will be available.

TREE ID HIKE – SUNDAY, MARCH 1

A lot of the resource management decisions made at the park are based on the existing landscape and how it can be restored. Trees are an integral component of the ecosystem and there is great interest in learning how to identify them. Park Ranger Clay Veasey will lead this hike along the Lake Channel Overlook trail and explain how to use bark patterns, seeds, nuts and cones and fallen leaves and needles to figure out what trees are towering above. Meet at the Catawba River Area office breezeway at 10 a.m.

SPRING IS IN THE AIR - SUNDAY, MARCH 8

With spring only a couple of weeks away, park visitors are anxious to see the cold winter temperatures succumb. As the temperatures change, so do the behaviors of the resident plants and animals. Meet Park Ranger Kevin Bischof for a hike along the Fox Den Loop trail to discover the early spring activity at the park. The 2.5 mile hike will leave at 10 a.m. from the park office located in the Catawba River Area.

WATERFOWL BOAT TOUR - SUNDAY, MARCH 15

Lake James plays host to many species of waterfowl during the early spring migration, as well as the critters that stay here year-round. Renowned waterfowl expert, Ranger Earl Weaver will be your captain and guide aboard the park patrol boat as we search for loons, otters, eagles and scenic vistas. The weather could be blustery, so be sure to dress warmly if you are one of the eight lucky participants. Registration is required and available on a first-come, first-served basis. Call the park office at 828-584-7728 to reserve your spot. Meet at the Paddy's Creek Area East Picnic Shelter at 1:50 p.m. for a briefing and prompt 2 p.m. departure.



SPRING PEEPER PROMENADE – SATURDAY, MARCH 21

What are those? They sound like crickets, maybe katydids ... but they aren't. When the temperatures warm up just a little bit, any wet drainage blossoms with the calls of one our smallest frogs - the Spring Peeper. This program will be designed as a hike and will set out to discuss various frog species, but specifically focus on the diminutive Spring Peeper. Several frog habitat types will be searched including a known Spring Peeper hotspot. Meet Park Ranger Kevin Bischof at the Holly Discovery Trail parking area at 2 p.m. and be prepared to walk about a mile.

WATERFOWL WATCH - SATURDAY, MARCH 21

Lake James is a spring stopover for many ducks, grebes, loons and other migratory waterfowl. These birds are once a gain massing for their northward migration in anticipation of the coming breeding season. Park Ranger Jamie Cameron will have his field guide and a spotting scope to help participants enjoy viewing some of these colorful travelers before they go. Bring binoculars if you have them and dress for the weather. Meet at the Paddy's Creek Area bathhouse breezeway at 10 a.m.

AMPHIBIAN ROUND-UP - SUNDAY, MARCH 22

Warmer nights and early spring showers create perfect conditions for salamanders, frogs and toads. Park Ranger Jamie Cameron knows where to go to find some of these elusive critters and invites you to come along. The search will begin at the Holly Discovery Trail parking area at 2 p.m. Knee boots or hip waders will be helpful for more adventurous participants, but they are not required.

ASTRONOMY FOR EVERYONE – SATURDAY, MARCH 28

Back by popular demand, Lake James State Park will be hosting the Catawba Valley Astronomy Club for a night of star gazing. Learn some basic star gazing tips and take home your own star chart. There will be telescopes and binoculars set up for viewing the night sky, but feel free to bring your own if you have them. Folding chairs are also recommended. We will meet in the upper parking lot of the Paddy's Creek Area at 8:00 P.M. Register by calling the park office at 828-584-7728.



LOONS OF THE LAKE – SUNDAY, MARCH 29

Lake James is a wintering spot for dozens of common loons. On quiet, still mornings you can often hear their iconic cries echoing across the water. Join Ranger Earl Weaver aboard the park's patrol boat in search of these graceful waterbirds and others that call Lake James home before they head north for the breeding season. Registration is required and only the first eight respondents will get to enjoy this unique opportunity. Meet at the East Picnic Shelter at Paddy's Creek Area at 1:50 p.m.

SPRING PHOTO SAFARI – TUESDAY, MARCH 31

Shutterbugs and novices alike can capture great images at Lake James State Park during every season, but spring is especially rewarding. With new growth literally bursting out of the ground and birds, mammals, reptiles and amphibians shaking off their winter doldrums, there's no telling what kind of subjects we'll find for the camera. Join Park Ranger Jamie Cameron, an award-winning photo-journalist, for a laid back hike in the woods. Bring whatever camera gear you have; from the top-of-the-line Nikon SLR, to a Smart Phone. CONCERT AT THE CREEK – SATURDAY, APRIL 4

Spring peepers, chorus frogs, Fowler's toads, whip-poorwills and more will blend their sounds into a symphony to remember. Park Ranger Jamie Cameron will be on hand to pick out and identify the performers as the sun goes down. Meet at the Holly Discovery Trail parking area at 7 p.m.

OLD HOME SITE TOUR – SUNDAY, APRIL 5

Before there was Lake James, the Catawba River and Paddy's Creek were home to communities of farmers.



Their legacy remains along the lakeshore in the homesite ruins they left behind and we can learn a lot about life during those times if we consider the structures they built. Join Ranger Clay Veasey on a hike to some of the homesites along park trails. Meet at the Paddy's Creek Area bathhouse breezeway at 10 a.m. for this popular and informative trip back in time.

SPRINGTIME AT FOX DEN LOOP – SUNDAY, APRIL 5

Spring is in the air and there's no better time or place to enjoy the warmth than the Fox Den Loop Trail. We'll be looking at wildflowers, trees, insects, birds and anything else that may be out and about. If we're lucky, we might even catch a glimpse of the red foxes that gave the trail its name. Meet Ranger Jamie Cameron for this moderate, 2-1/4-mile hike at the Catawba River Area picnic shelter at 2 p.m. Wear clothing and footwear that will be appropriate for the weather forecast.

WATER QUALITY AT THE MOUNTAIN GATEWAY MUSEUM - SATURDAY, APRIL 11

Not every ranger program takes place at the park. Ranger Kevin Bischof will be streamside at the Mountain Gateway Museum in Old Fort for a fun exploration of freshwater critters. Nets, magnifying glasses, ID keys and observation tanks will be set up on the banks of the Catawba River to show just how diverse and amazing our precious waterways can be. BIRDS OF THE HOLLY DISCOVERY TRAIL – SATURDAY, APRIL 18

Spring migration is in full swing as songbirds, raptors and waterfowl return from the tropics to answer the urge to nest. With its easy, ¾-mile loop through excellent, bottomland forest habitat, the Holly Discovery Trail is the perfect place to observe many species as they strive to complete their epic journey. Park Ranger Earl Weaver will lead the adventure, starting at the Holly Discovery trail parking area at 8:50 a.m. Bring binoculars and a field guide if you have them.

We all need trees for many reasons. Join Park Superintendent Nora Coffey for story time and activities with Dr. Seuss's The Lorax. This program is perfect for families with children in grades preK-8. Meet at the Catawba River Area basement classroom at 10 a.m.

TOAD TREK - SATURDAY, APRIL 25


Wait! Did you see that? Ever wonder what that little critter was that hopped off the road as you drove through Lake James State Park? Join Park Ranger Kevin Bischof as he leads a group on a search for the amphibians that can be seen so commonly hopping off the roads. Meet at the West Picnic Shelter in the Paddy's Creek Area of the park and be prepared to walk about a mile. The program starts at 7:30 p.m. so don't miss out on this hopping good time!



SPRING MIGRATION BIRD HIKE – SUNDAY, APRIL 26

Bird life is abundant along the lakeshore as species make their annual trek from the wintering grounds in the south, to the nesting territories in the north. Some birds will end their journeys here to find a mate, build a nest and raise their young. It's an incredibly exciting time of year to be a birdwatcher and this hike is timed to

meet the greatest diversity of warblers, vireos, tanagers, grosbeaks and buntings. Meet Park Ranger Jamie Cameron at the Paddy's Creek Area bathhouse breezeway at 8 a.m. Bring binoculars and a field guide if you have them and dress appropriately for the weather.



NATURE NOTES

Spring is approaching and the amphibians of Lake James State Park are starting to make themselves seen, and especially heard. As the warming weather melts the winter chill out of the air, frog, toad, and salamander sightings increase. One of the most common frog species in the park can heard much more easily than seen. The Spring Peeper announces its presence as the name implies, with a birdlike "peep" that can be heard on warm days around Lake James as early as February, and in some, rare cases, even January. Usually centralized around wet areas such as drainages and swamps, the Spring Peeper can congregate in large numbers, during which their cumulative calling (called a chorus) can be quite loud.

The Spring Peeper is a small frog approximately ¾-1-1/2 inches in length that comes in colors including tan, brown, grey and even orange. The Peeper is patterned with an distinctive "X," located directly on the frog's back. In McDowell and Burke Counties, the Spring Peeper breeds at the nd of February and the beginning of March. Each female Peeper lays about 900 eggs which hatch in just a few days. From the eggs emerge tadpoles which will metamorphosis into a frog in approximately six weeks. Spring Peepers stay hidden, but are readily preyed upon by many opportunistic animals including other frogs, toads, snakes, turtles and even birds such as the Great Blue Heron.

The amphibians are not the only park inhabitants that will be on the move with the warmer weather. Reptiles, their cold-blooded cousins will be active on warmer days, in addition to many bird species that use Lake James State Park as temporary solace along their long migratory patterns. Say good-bye to the winter months and come out to the park and keep your ears and eyes open

for the park's emerging animals.

2015 is The Year of the Amphibian and there will be a wide variety of amphibian programs offered by park staff leading visitors to explore and discover the wonderful world of these amazing animals. Please keep an eye out for the program calendar of events located on the Lake James website and our bi-monthly newsletters.

RIDERS TO RECEIVE FIRST TRAIL FEATURE



As part of its continuing effort to create a dynamic, fun-filled track for mountain bike trail enthusiasts, Lake James State Park's maintenance staff is recycling what Nature is finished with.

During the fall, disease killed a large white pine that loomed over sites 19 and 20 in the Catawba River Area campground. The tree was an immediate hazard to campers using those sites, so the staff decided to bring it down during the relative safety of the offseason. Once the formidable giant was on the ground, the wheel of creativity started to turn.

Trails specialist, Andrew Carswell looked at the massive trunk and imagined a fun, technical feature to add to the park's popular West Wimba mountain bike loop. With help from maintenance mechanic, Darrin Oliver and a lot of sweat equity, the two halved a 14-foot section of the lower trunk to serve as a natural water crossing.

"It's going to be our first technical feature for the intermediate loop trails," said Carswell. "There will also be a hard crossing option for riders to choose from. Once this bridge is in place, we'll be looking for more opportunities to add interest and difficulty to the Wimba loops."

Carswell said he hopes to have the new pine bridge in place sometime during the first half of March, with help from the volunteer Lake James Trail Crew, which has taken on much of the upkeep for the mountain bike trails.


