

THE 11TH ANNUAL CATAWBA RIVERFEST Get Ready for Lake James State Park's Signature event!

This fun-fill, family-oriented celebration of the Catawba River Basin and recognition of its economic and recreational value to the communities within will take place Sept. 20th at the Paddy's Creek Area, from 10 a.m. until 3 p.m. Interactive information booths for dozens of area conservation, outdoor recreation and local history organizations will tell the story of how the river has shaped this region and the many challenges it faces today. Live musical entertainment will be provided by Alan Darveaux with Slight Departure, who will take their traditional folk sound to the people by roving throughout the festival grounds.

This year, a pre-festival bike ride on the new mountain bike trails at the park will highlight this very popular activity. Stay tuned for this and other cycling-related programs as festival plans solidify. Scheduled exhibitors include:


EDIBLE PLANTS - Sunday, Sept. 7

SNAKES! - Saturday, Sept. 13

"The only good snake is a dead snake"... or so the saying goes. Some of the most feared, hated and misunderstood animals in nature; snakes are found throughout Lake James State Park. While there are two venomous, potentially dangerous species, most snakes here are harmless. Meet Park Ranger Kevin Bischof at the Holly Discovery Trail parking area for a hike along the Overmountain Victory Trail. Along the way we'll go through prime snake habitat, discuss the natural history of these legless park residents and, with any luck, see one for ourselves. Please wear sturdy hiking shoes, bring water and be prepared to walk for about an hour. The program starts at 10 a.m.

OVERMOUNTAIN VICTORY TRAIL ANNUAL MARCH AND CELEBRATION - Tuesday, Sept. 30

During the early stages to the Revolutionary War, a band of southern frontiersmen set out on a journey to find and engage a British-sponsored army and defeat it at the Battle of King's Mountain. Come out to Lake James State Park and walk in the footsteps of freedom along a segment of the Overmountain Victory National Historic Trail. We will depart from the Holly Discovery Trail parking area at 6:00 p.m. for a short hike, before regrouping at the swim beach at 7:30 p.m. for storytelling and music, courtesy of the Overmountain Victory Trail Association and the Backwater String Band.

AMPHIBIAN - Wednesday, Oct. 1 (TACO Week)

September is a fantastic time of year to see some of the Lake James cold-blooded residents. Meet Ranger Kevin Bischof as he explores the Holly Discovery Trail in attempt to discover some of the amphibians that live in the park. The hike is approximately .75-mile in length and starts 7 p.m. from the Holly Discovery Trailhead in the Paddy's Creek Area of the park.

WHO WAS HERE? - Saturday, Oct. 4

Many park visitors explore the trails of Lake James and have the good fortune to see some of the wonderful wildlife that lives inside the park. Hike with Ranger Kevin Bischof along the Fox Den Loop Trail to discover the tracks and signs left behind by the animals that inhabit Lake James State Park. FALL COLOR AT LAKE JAMES - Sunday, Oct. 5

Learn how to identify old home sites and begin the process of discovering the stories they tell about their inhabitants. Meet at the Paddy's Creek Area bathhouse breezeway at 10 a.m.

NATURE NOTES

As summer begins its inevitable transition into fall, birds and animals change their habits to reflect the season.

For many birds, autumn is a time of long-distance migration; from the breeding grounds in the North, to the wintering grounds in the South. Some species, like hermit thrush, golden-crowned kinglet, dark-eyed junco and yellow-bellied sapsucker, will arrive at Lake James and find the climate suitable for overwintering. Others, like broad-winged hawk, bobolink, Baltimore oriole and dozens of warbler species, will only pass through our area on the way to winter territories in the tropics.

Birdwatchers delight in the multitudes this time of year and the park has proven itself to be a top-notch birding destination during the fall, with sightings of unusual species like white-rumped sandpiper, yellow warbler, savannah sparrow and dickcissel among the recent records.

It may seem counterintuitive, but autumn is also a fantastic time to observe butterflies, especially around the native flower gardens at the Paddy's Creek Area office. New York ironweed, Joe-pye-weed, narrow-leafed sunflower, various asters and butterfly weed all do their part to attract a wide variety of butterflies. Sizes and shapes will vary; from the tiny skippers to the impressive swallowtails, but all of them find their way to the food sources. Of course, everyone is hoping for a return of the monarch butterflies, but early reports from up North indicate it's going to be another year of scarcity for these amazing insects. Habitat losses in both the summertime milkweed fields of the U.S. and Canada and the tiny winter micro-habitat in northern

Mexico, combined with a cool, wet spring, have conspired against the monarchs. Anyone who spots a monarch on its southbound migration this fall should consider themself lucky. Let's hope for better days ahead for these iconic and embattled butterflies.

The mammals of Lake James State Park will also be on the move. White-tailed deer are back in the forest eating acorns and soft mast like persimmons and wild grapes wherever they can find them. Sightings of foxes and bobcats tend to increase this time of year and there's always the possibility of spotting a black bear. In fact, the park staff had two separate sightings of bears within one week of each other at different ends of the park back in early August. As always, keep your speed to the park's 25-mph limit to give wildlife a chance to cross the roads safely.

Many people consider fall to be the finest time to enjoy the park. Hope to see you out on the trail.

EAGLE SCOUT PROGRAM



Lake James State Park has a long-standing relationship with the Boy Scouts of America's Eagle Scout program. Over the years, dozens of area Eagle Scout candidates have performed their community service projects at the park. Examples include clearing and cleaning up the park's historic cemeteries, repairing hiking trails and constructing educational displays.

Last month, John Thompson completed an ambitious project to design, construct and deploy three rustic benches along the Mills Creek Loop Trail.

Hikers will certainly appreciate the new sitting spots, strategically located along the 3.6-mile track within the Paddy's Creek Area. John and his hard-working crew of Scouts placed the benches during the last week in July, braving high heat, humidity and a particularly angry swarm of yellow jackets. In total, the Scouts and their adult advisors put in more than 100 volunteer hours to complete the project.

So the next time you find yourself on the Mill's Creek Loop looking for a place to rest your trail-weary feet, think of John and his team and the hard work they put in.

PADDLEBOARDING AT THE LAKE



The Friends of Lake James State Park have made an exciting addition to the park's rental fleet with the donation of two new paddleboards and the accompanying gear to go with them.

Stand-up paddleboards have become very popular in recent years as people come to realize how versatile they can be and what a great workout they can provide.


In fact, the lifeguard staff at the Paddy's Creek Area beach has been using a paddleboard to give them a different perspective on the swimming area for the past two seasons.

"The park staff came to us last fall to discuss the possibility of the Friends group purchasing paddleboards to add to their rental fleet," explained

Friends of Lake James State Park president Eric Jenkins. "Considering how popular the sport has become, it was a no-brainer for the board of directors to appropriate the funding to make that happen. We spent around \$750 on what we strongly believe will be a win-win for the park and its visitors."

The paddleboards will be available to rent at the same rate as the canoes and kayaks; \$5 for the first hour and \$3 for every hour after that. Rentals are on a first-come, first-served basis, between the hours of 10 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. for as long as the concessions stand remains open through the season.

"The Friends group is continuing its tradition of supporting the park and expanding the outdoor recreational opportunities we can provide to our visitors with the donation of these paddleboards," said park superintendent Nora Coffey. "It's another great example of our community participating in their state park."



Your favorite state park continues to build upon its role as an innovator within the West District and the division of parks and recreation as a whole. First, the Holly Discovery Trail at Lake James State Park proved that a contemporary and interactive nature experience could be conceived, designed and built inhouse while saving taxpayers more than \$100,000 and winning state and national awards for excellence. Next, it joined the forefront of state parks in the mountains to use prescribed fire to reduce the likelihood of a catastrophic wildfire and improve native and historic habitat. Then, Lake James State Park opened its much-anticipated mountain bike trail system to the tune of more than 13 miles of pedal-pumping, calf-burning undulating track for beginners and intermediate-level riders. And now, goats.

That's right, goats. The park recently introduced a herd of approximately 30 goats to help combat a large infestation of kudzu taking over 3 acres within the "river section," below the spillway along NC 126. It is the first time a North Carolina state park has used goats to control an invasive and exotic plant. Due to its proximity to the Old Catawba River and the difficulty of accessing the kudzu patch, traditional methods utilizing large volume herbicide sprayers was logistically and environmentally undesirable. Goats, with their prodigious appetites for leafy greens and relatively low-impact on the environment (in the short term), are the perfect tool to reduce large infestations of the obnoxious vine before following up with directed and judicious application of an herbicide.

The goats are owned by Ron Searcy, of Wells Farm in Horse Shoe, N.C. His herds for hire have munched down kudzu patches at Davidson College and near Tryon, High Point and even Long Island, N.Y.

Ranger Jamie Cameron is the park's lead natural resources manager and has high hopes for the future use of goats in other North Carolina state parks. "The goats have been on the ground since early July and they have been eating their way through the infested area at a remarkable rate," he said. "We'll have them back in the fall to knock back the re-growth and carefully apply an herbicide to any kudzu that shows signs of life. Lake James is the first state park in the division to use goats in this manner and our success or failure will set the tone for other parks with exotic and invasive plant species to consider goats as a management option."
