#### Highlights from District 7

The members of District 7 are truly living the GFWC spirit. District 7 was hit hard this hurricane season. Historic storm Florence followed by Michael did not stop our members from helping others in their communities while they dealt with their own damages from the storms. Their club women donated supplies and money to other nonprofits in their communities as well as volunteered by working in various capacities handing out much needed supplies and preparing meals for those in need. The Boys and Girls Club of NC is located in our district and while they served in many ways during and immediately after the storm, their campus was damaged as well as supplies were depleted. Their clubwomen stepped up and donated to help replenish their supplies. It will take a long time to rebuild our communities but with clubwomen helping lead the way, they will rebuild stronger than ever!

Shortly after these storms we conducted their scheduled Fall District meeting in Wilmington. And like the strong clubwomen they are, they gathered to celebrate their blessings and continue their efforts in helping those in need. They were honored to have their own Ann Landis, GFWC-NC President and Karen Throckmorton, GFWC-NC Corresponding Secretary attend and bring them valuable information from the State level.

They were also honored to have two speakers who spoke on Ovarian Cancer, an emphasis with the District President's Special Project, Woman's Cancers. She ROCKS, (Research, Ovarian, Cancer, Knowledge and Support) Inc., a nonprofit located in Wilmington is dedicated to raising funds for ovarian cancer research and provide local support to those affected by Ovarian Cancer. District 7 is proud to partner with She ROCKS to help combat this horrible disease. Earlier this year, the organization expanded to the Triad region of the state. Their website, www.she-rocks.org provides valuable information on this silent killer. Ovarian Cancer is the deadliest of the gynecological cancers. There are 22,000 diagnoses of ovarian cancer in the US every year and about 14,000 deaths. This means 1 in 71 women will develop ovarian cancer. There is no screening test and many women are misdiagnosed in the beginning. Symptoms can include bloating, pelvic/abdominal bloating, difficulty eating or feeling full quickly, and urinary symptoms (frequency-urgency). Ladies are encouraged to take proactive steps and consult with their doctor should they experience any symptoms and get yearly exams.

The time of reporting and award entries is upon us!

#### ALL Award & Report Entries are due no later than February 1!!!!

We have new forms and new ways of entering your project information onto the award entry forms. As you move through the new process, please know that You. Are. Not. Alone!! We are here to help you. Do not hesitate to reach out to us. If you have ANY question, just ASK!! If you don't ask, we can't help.

Every form you need is on the www.gfwcnc.org website under **Community Service**, then **Awards and Reports**. There are updates (new addresses, etc.) on the forms. So the very latest is available on the website. All forms are offered in both PDF and Word format. **Please utilize these NEW forms!!!** If you haven't seen the new website, now is the time to check it out.

!!Pay attention to the instructions on each award entry form!! Some are different than the others. Clubs not following the instructions may be disqualified from the award.

If there is not an award entry form, there is not an award offered. Changes to awards were announced at the Summer Meeting and in the Fall Clubwoman Magazine. Again, this information is available online, as well as tips and general information.

Numbers for the GFWC 7 Grand Initiatives are reported on the Club Participation and Statistical Report (CP&S) Form sent to Club Presidents. This form is due to the 1st Vice President by February 1. Although it may seem as a cross entry, you can enter projects for the 7 Grand Initiatives under the corresponding

CSP (example – Dr. Seuss books in Education). We just need the basic numbers separate from the projects.

#### Frequently Asked Questions about the process:

## Can we count any hours volunteered by our members?

-No, clubs report only those hours spent by each member in projects approved by the club. Club approved projects should be in your minutes or are in your club newsletters.

## Can we count hours volunteered by our family and friends?

-No, ONLY club member hours can be reported. You can certainly mentioned that family, friends, etc. helped with a project in the narrative, but their hours cannot count.

## Does it matter which category a club reports a project?

-Yes, which category you report your project in is important! When in doubt, ask yourself what the intent of the project is. That should help you find where it should be reported. You are welcome to reach out to me if you need help determining the correct category.

#### What does the term in-kind refer to?

-In-kind is a donation of goods or services, not monetary or cash. The in-kind gift can be new or used goods or services that have a value. If a club purchased materials and donates those materials (not the money), that donation is in-kind with an actual value of what was spent. Gift cards with actual money value are considered the same as cash.

#### When a club reports what they raised in fundraising and where they donated it in a report, is that cross reporting?

-No, clubs should report according to the following **Continued page 11**

Please remember to review the following changes to the Arts Festival for 2018-2020:

- ${\bf 1}.$  Crafts will have separate Chairman for Clubwomen and Students.
- 2. Visual Arts will have separate Chairman for Clubwomen and Students.

#### **General Reminders**

Use the State Brochure to govern your local and district contests. Unfortunately if a requirement is not met, a winner may not be eligible. Please make sure you are aware of each contest rule.

#### **IMPORTANT RULES:**

- No Frames! No Glass!!! Visual Art submitted with frames and/or glass will be disqualified.
- The only exception is simple frames for canvas entries.
- ArtFest entries it is preferred that no glass or frame be used.
- Photography 8"x10" submission only will be accepted NO matting allowed. Winners for Clubwomen go on to the GFWC Contest.
- Literature Contest Authors must not be professional writers earnings may not exceed \$500 annually.
- PLEASE review ALL rules regarding submissions. Any disqualified art will be allowed for display but not judging.

#### **DEADLINES**

- ALL Art Entries Deadline: February 23, 2019
- Literature Deadline: February 16, 2019
- Adhere to deadlines!!! If your district is having a late Festival, it is your responsibility to make sure the chairs know when they can expect the District entries.

#### DISTRICT CHAIR RESPONSIBILITIES

- The District Chairs are responsible for entering District winners with the appropriate State Contest Chairs. The Form can be found on page 7 of the Arts Festival Guidelines.
- There will not be any onsite contest registration all must be pre-registered.

#### **CLUB RESPONSIBILITIES**

- Clubs are responsible for notifying District winners they are sponsoring in each contest of the date, time, and location of the State Arts Festival.
- Clubs are responsible for registering ALL Arts Festival attendees with GFWC-NC.
- Registration must be paid for all clubwoman.
- Label entries completely using the format and including all info requested in the brochure. Be sure that the right category is indicated on the entry card. Take special care if another club is transporting entries for you.

• Due to budget constraints, cash awards may be less than in the past years and may not be awarded to all entries Page 12 · Winter 2019 that place. Consult the official rules for details.

- Checks must be cashed before the end of the fiscal year on June 30th.

## 2019 GFWC-NC Scholarship Update

The judges will review each district applicant in advance. Each applicant will be interviewed individually and scored immediately after the interview. The G-J Chairman will tally the scores. After the judges confer, their decision will be reported to the G-J Chairman who will contact the winner and runner up along with the sponsoring club presidents by phone. The G-J Chairman will contact the GFWC-NC Executive Committee and then send a letter to the applicants, sponsoring Club Presidents and District Scholarship Chairmen notifying them of the results. A copy of the letter will sent to GFWC-NC Headquarters for their files. The results will be shared with GFWC-NC clubwomen through the Federation Friday communications.





The report of your year's work is too important to trust to my temperamental computer. Juniors may submit theirs to Bridgett, the Education Chairman of Junior clubs, electronically.

Remember to include the **impact** of your project, and use the responses of the recipients and the participants to liven up the report. Allow your **enthusiasm**, your **passion**, your **heart** to show—this will set your description apart from just the dry "facts and figures" kind of report.

**ESO (Epsilon Sigma Omicron):** North Carolina's Goal: Read 1,000 books this year! You can see I took a page from President Brock's Grand Initiatives. Our members are readers, so this should be easy. We can do this! ESO Chairman Julie Rigsbee can send all the information you need.

Over the years, many pledges have fallen by the wayside. It is time to reconnect. Make your meetings interesting, educational, and social, extend personal invitations, and they will come!. Members can become **active** again with **one** report sent in annually-just 4 books!

Recording ESO time spent reading need not be hard.

Read for one hour and use the number of pages as your ruler. If you read 50 pages, simply divide 50 into the total number of pages of books you've read to get the total number of hours.

FOCUS ON LITERACY CLUB GRANT - need funds for an education literacy project? Up to \$200.00 is available and funds may be used for purchasing books for tutors to use, providing books to children, and/or a variety of other literacy needs. A statistical report required to be completed by all clubs (CP&S forms). CP&S reports will now be submitted to the 1st Vice President.

#### **AWARD ENTRY:**

Narratives detailing project information which clubs submit to win State and District awards.

#### **GFWC-NC** Award Forms Get an Update

In an effort to make reporting and award entries more efficient for our membership and to make the time spent writing reports and awards more valuable, the 2018-2020 Executive Committee has approved the following changes to the process.

#### **OVERVIEW:**

Four major changes to the Community Service Program (CSP) Award Entry Form:

- Partnerships have been combined onto each CSP entry form - One CSP, One Award Entry Form.
- TOP 5 Projects / Programs ONLY will be listed on the CSP form and included in the narrative.
- 3. The <u>narrative</u> pages have been expanded to <u>three</u> pages plus the cover sheet.
- Club Creativity Project One of the 5 projects/programs may be chosen to be entered as the Club Creativity Project.

#### 1. GFWC Partnerships

#### No CSP Partnership Awards!!

The separate awards for CSP Partnerships are no longer. But that doesn't mean that Partnerships are gone!

They are still active, viable organizations and clubs are encouraged to participate, fund and help GFWC Partnerships just as they always have. *These details still need to be reported on the annual CP&S Form.* 

But instead of a separate form, Partnerships are listed on each CSP Award entry that has a partnership. Clubs no longer have to worry about two different award entry forms.

GFWC-NC 1st Vice President

#### 2. TOP 5 Projects!!

Clubs are asked to only submit their TOP 5 Projects and/or Programs. Each CSP form will have a place to list out the top 5 projects/programs.

#### Benefits:

- · Reduces overall work for clubs
- "Levels the playing field" for clubs due to the different sizes of the clubs.
- Instead of entering all projects under one CSP, some may be moved to be entered under an Advancement.

#### 3. Narrative Expansion

The award narrative has expanded to **three** (3) pages. This will allow clubs to provide more detail on the impact the project or program made on the community and the club (i.e how did it feel for the club to help and those in the community to be helped) and not just provide the raw data of donations and time.

Similar projects can be grouped into one project thereby becoming a program (i.e. serving lunch at a soup kitchen on three occasions and donating funds to that same soup kitchen).

#### 4. Club Creativity Award

Each club will have the option to submit one project of the five listed projects as their most creative project.

The project narrative should detail the impact this project made on the community and on the club and what makes this project stand out among other projects.

This is not another entry, clubs will designate on the entry form which of the Top 5 will be their submission. No additional work is needed.

These Advancement areas and special programs & projects will also adhere to the Top 5 entry rule and the Club Creativity Project Award.


#### Communications & Public Relations Changes

Club yearbook, membership brochure and newsletter awards will be combined into the Community and Public Relations Award to provide clubs an opportunity to detail all of the ways they communicate with their community (i.e. social media).

Newsletters and websites may be submitted to GFWC directly.

#### No Cross Entries! Exceptions are...

These awards MAY have entries included from other CSP or Advancement areas. They are the ONLY Exception!!!

- · Boys & Girls Homes

- Membership Cooperation & Involvement
- President's and/or Director of Juniors' Special Projects.

#### Other Award Changes

Drug Education Award has been expanded to include Adult Education.

Child Self-Esteem Award has been expanded to include anti-bullying programs.

Effective Involvement of Members has been RENAMED Membership Cooperation and Involvement. This award entry will be submitted to the President-elect.

Federation Day Awards will no longer need to be submitted to the District to be eligible for a State award. Entries may be provided to District and State chairs. District chairs will not be providing award entries to the State chair.

The Community Improvement Program award entry shall be sent to the 1st Vice-President.

ESO is now a part of the Education Community Service Program. There is a specific Award Entry Form for ESO.

#### Don't Forget the CP&S!!

All projects and programs STILL need to be entered onto the Club Participation & Statistical Report Form (CP&S). Just because it isn't on an award entry form doesn't mean you can forget about it. PLEASE report all your hours, dollars and projects and programs on the CP&S Form. The form will now go to the 1st Vice President rather than the 2nd Vice President.

In order for a club to be an Honor Club, the CP&S Report must be submitted no later than February 1st. Information is always for the prior reporting year.

#### Reminders!!

- Clubs should follow all instructions on the award entry form and contact the State Chair with any questions prior to entry.
- Award entries should be submitted to the one appropriate contact on the award entry form (i.e. General entries to the General contact, Junior entries to the Junior contact).
- EVERY Award Entry has it's own form and <u>MUST</u> be included with each submission.
- Award entries are due to be postmarked or emailed by midnight February 1st.
- Clubs should review the GFWC definition in the Administration Book of the Community Service Program and enter the project under the appropriate Program.

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# Arts Community Service Project Sandy Cyphers, GFWC-NC Arts Chairman & Jean Woodley, GFWC-NC

#### **Arts Junior Chairman**

Is your club preparing for participation in one or maybe even all the **Arts Top 10 GFWC-NC CSP Projects**? We hope so and cannot think of a single reason **NOT TO!** 

GFWC-NC enjoys recognizing its clubs and members for the efforts and commitment they make in sharing and being involved in the **Arts** in their respective communities. Art projects make a difference in the lives of our members and those in the communities they serve.

Below is the list of the **TOP 10 GFWC-NC Club CSP** winners for last year to share with you followed by the **Top 10 reasons for THE ARTS** in society.

#### Project: Charity Boxes for Christmas The Woman's Club of Raleigh

A special Christmas Tree in the parlor of their club house was decorated using the color unique for each CSP to craft ornaments symbolic of each CSP. They chose to make crystal beaded spider web ornaments with pink ribbons. All CSPs arranged "Charity Boxes" under the club Christmas Tree to collect for specific community need. The Arts CSP collected art supplies for Triangle Family Services. Items collected will serve to entertain and occupy children ages 3-12 who are in a supervised situation while their parents are speaking privately with a therapist. Donated items included craft kit, crayons, cards to color, sticker books, as well as non-perishable food snacks.

#### Project: Arts Plus Festival Hickory Woman's Club

This event was held at a regular club meeting and all attendees served as judges. The only rule of the event was that the item entered had to be made by or be the property of the individual who submitted the entry. Categories included vintage photography, creative expressions, retro-lectibles and artistic cuisine. The "cuisine" was served as dessert. Treat bags were given to each participant and "Golden Mug" awards were presented to the winners in each category. The goals of increasing participation in a club project (90%), interaction among members and individual recognition, were all met.

Project: Exceptional Art A. L. Brown Juniorettes

A.L. Brown Juniorettes made crafts and cards for their adopted Exceptional Children classes for each holiday. Some of their activities included: making winter crafts (snowmen, penguins, and snowflakes), Valentine's Day cards, St. Patrick Day crafts and treats, making Easter crafts and treats, making Thanksgiving and Christmas cards and crafts.

#### Project: Sweet Chari-Tea GFWC-NC Statesville Woman's Club

This club hosted their 3rd "Sweet Chari-Tea" ARTS Fundraiser held in a pre-Civil War home, The Historic Sharpe House. Tickets were pre-sold for \$20 each. Guests were treated to an afternoon of tea and "dainties", served by wait-staff donned in mid-1800's style attire. Every room of the home contained silent auction items for browsing and bidding. Silent Auction items were donated by local and out of town businesses. The caterer donated half of the catering cost and the Sharpe Home charged a minimal fee for use of the facility. Mitchell Community College donated the design and production of the event tickets and auction catalog. \$1,600 was raised to fund the 2018 GFWC-NC Statesville Woman's Club Arts Scholarship.

#### Project: Kindness Rocks GFWC-Holden Beach

The GFWC-NC Holden Beach Arts CSP was responsible for one of the Art Workshops presented at their GFWC-NC District 7 Spring Meeting. The club selected the "Kindness Rocks" project that promoted painting and sharing rocks with inspirational messages. Over 120 smooth rocks of all sizes were washed and sprayed with acrylic paint in a variety of colors. Instructions were prepared and special oil based pens were provided for workshop attendees. Rocks were painted with "You Matter", "Be Yourself", "Enjoy Sunshine", and "You Rock". Completed rocks were delivered to the Boys and Girls Homes of North Carolina and placed around the complex grounds.

## Project: **Art in the Park Wake Forest Woman's Club**

**Art in the Park** is an annual event held in conjunction with the Town of Wake Forest's July 4th Celebration. WFWC member provided eight patriotic crafts to make and cupcakes to frost. Over 400 children

enjoyed the event. Projects included (1) a photo booth at which children dressed like Lady Liberty and had their picture taken in front of a large American flag, (2) a Betsy Ross flag which children constructed with pieces of tissue paper and is now on display in the Town Hall, (3) Liberty Bells, (4) Sparkle Star Visors, (5) Coloring pages and (6) Fireworks painting. Clubwomen educated the children on the reason for the July 4th Celebration as they made crafts and iced their cupcakes.

#### Project: Local Arts Festival Fuquay-Varina Woman's Club & Junior Club & Juniorettes

The **Arts Festival** was a collaborative effort between **FVWC**, **FVJWC** and **FV Juniorettes**. Preparations began in August for January's two-day event which was held at the Windsor Pointe in Fuquay-Varina. The festival was promoted in the local schools, library and clubs, as well as, on Facebook, the web, social media and local newspaper. Entries for literature, arts, crafts and photography were judged by professional in each respective category. Once judging completed, the entries were available for viewing. Ribbons were given to all 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place winners. Participation certificates were given to all students, general and junior clubwomen who submitted entries. The Festival was attended by over 590 with refreshments served to all guests on Saturday and Sunday.

## Project: **Operation Bedroll Greensboro Woman's Club**

Greensboro Woman's Club members collaborated with the City of Greensboro's Field Operations and Police Department to keep non-recyclable materials out of their landfills. It then was used to help some of the neediest residents have a safer place to sleep through "Operation Bedroll" project. Club members cut thousands of plastic grocery bags to create "plarn" (plastic yarn) which was used to crochet sleeping mats that provided an insulated and waterproof barrier for those who sleep on the ground. This project involved a large majority of their membership who worked over the course of a three-month time period, collecting bags, making plarn and crocheting. One adult size bedroll requires 500-700 plastic bags and takes approximately 30-50 hours to crochet. GWC presented 8 bedrolls to the City and received recognition in the social media, along with photos published in the local Greensboro News & Record.

#### Project: Local Arts Festival Anderson Creek Woman's Club

Anderson Creek Woman's Club hosted their 7th Annual Arts Festival for students and clubwomen bringing awareness of the arts to their community. At their Arts Festival, they display art entries from students K-12, club women and adults in the community. It is attended by school personnel, students and local residents. An

afternoon **Open House** is a child-friendly event where Art Awards are presented to students and community members. A **Formal Program** is held in the evening for adults which included presentation of two scholarships. One scholarship is named in memory of a former club member. A catered meal is provided, and a quilt raffle and silent auction are held with proceeds used to offset festival expenses.

#### Project: Local Arts Festival Burlington Woman's Club & Burlington Junior Woman's Club

The BWC and BJWC partnered for the 48th Annual, five-day, Arts Festival held in January. Preparations began in September as members reached out to local schools encouraging participation in the areas of visual arts and photography. Over 400 entries were received from student in grades 6-12. Club members served as docents during the event as members of the community enjoyed viewing the works of art on display. Entries were judged by professionals in their respective areas with lunch being provided for the judges. An awards program with refreshments for winners and their families was held one evening. Art not advancing to the District Arts Festival, along with certificates, ribbons and monetary awards were delivered to the students' schools the following week.

- 1. Working in the arts helps learners to develop creative problem-solving skills.
- 2. Teaching through the arts can present difficult concepts visually, making them easier to understand.
- 3. Art instruction helps children with the development of motor skills, language skills, social skills, decision-making, risk-taking, & inventiveness.
- 4. Visual arts teach learners about color, layout, perspective, & balance: all techniques that are necessary in presentations (visual, digital) of academic work.
- 5. Integrating art with other disciplines reaches students who might not otherwise be engaged in classwork.
- 6. Arts experiences boost critical thinking, teaching students to take the time to be more careful and thorough in how they observe the world.
- 7. The arts provide challenges for learners at all levels.
- 8. Art education connects students with their own culture as well as with the wider world.
- 9. A report by Americans for the Arts states that young people who participate regularly in the arts (three hours a day on three days each week through one full year) are four times more likely to be recognized for academic achievement, to participate in a math and science fair, or to win an award for writing an essay or poem than children who do not participate.
- 10.A study in public schools found that greater arts education led to fewer disciplinary infractions and higher attendance, graduation rates, and test scores.

# IT'S NEVER TOO EARLY – OR TOO LATE – TO WORK TOWARD BEING THE HEALTHIEST YOU!

A new year is often considered the perfect time for a "fresh start". It is also a great time to kick-off some new "Healthy Women" club project ideas and to resolve to focus attention on our specific project goals:

## 1. <u>WALKING:</u> To keep fit ... our walking goal will be to make it OVER THE MOON!

The Moon is about 250,000 miles from Earth ... we are on our way!

MEMBER TARGET: Walk 2.5 – 5 miles per day (about 5,000 – 10,000 steps per day)

2,000 steps or 20 minutes of brisk walking is considered a mile.

# <u>2. WELLNESS:</u> To stay well, do recommended check-ups, preventive screenings, and immunizations

MEMBER TARGET: Annual physical; annual mammogram/monthly breast self-exam; annual gynecological exam; annual dental checkup & cleaning

#### **Is Your Website Secure?**

Have you noticed that some websites use "https"? The "s" indicates that the website has obtained a Secure SocketsLayer (aka SSL) Certificate. SSL is a technology that provides security for sensitive information as it travels on the internet. It is needed even of your club is not accepting credit card payments thru its website

Additionally, many of the search engines such as Google and other popular search engines have indicated that websites which are not secure will appear lower in search results and are now warning users if they are trying to go to an unsecure website. Most users are not going to risk continuing to a site that has been identified as not secure!

To enable SSL on a website, your club will need to get an SSL Certificate that identifies it and install it on its web server. If the club is using a hosted website thru a third party such as Tripod or Go Daddy, the SSL Certificate can be obtained thru them. With newer websites, it may automatically be provided.

Can your club simply ignore this? NO. The bottom line - if your club is going to have a meaningful and useful website, it has to appear in search results and users can't be frightened away by the lack of security. Every club must make sure it has an SSL Certificate for its website.


The USO makes a difference in the lives of our men and women who are serving in the military.
