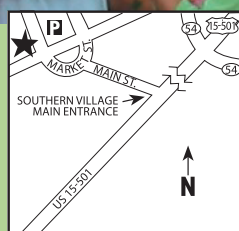

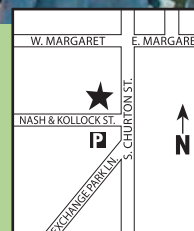

ENO FESTIVAL

West Point on the Eno

The annual celebration of the river, by the river and for the river takes place a dozen or so miles from downtown Carrboro at Durham City Park at West Point on the Eno.

The eater

This month The Eater turns over the reins to Merge Records' Paul Cardillo, a budding food writer. We asked Paul to offer an insider's guide for out-of-town peeps in town for XXMerge. Here's his advice:

NEAL'S DELI

You can't go wrong at Neal's, and could conceivably eat all your meals here. The breakfast biscuits are amazing, fluffy and light on the inside with an unexpected toothsome crispness on the outside. Try the pastrami, baked egg and swiss biscuit. All the lunchtime sandwiches at Neal's are great too, but the hot dogs trump pretty much everything. A great veal and pork dog on a brezel sub roll from Durham bakery Guglhupf. One isn't enough. Two is too many. Get them "all the way" with spicy mustard and sauerkraut.

TACO WAGONS

Carrboro is home to several taco wagons. All are good in their own right, but the one in the Fitch Lumber parking lot is my favorite. All of their tacos are superb, featuring fresh, soft corn tortillas from Don Jose's Tortilleria right down the street. Their tacos al pastor are sublime, with small bits of pineapple clinging to the marinated pork. Their carnitas are exceptional, and the beef barbacoa is very rich and seriously flavorful. Don't be afraid to try the Lengua (Tongue) Tacos, it's like the tenderest cut of beef you've ever had. The Melon Agua Fresca washes everything down nicely. Three tacos and an agua fresca is a fantastic dinner in the \$6.00 range. Carry the meal over to the lawn at Weaver Street and watch the spectacle of Carrboro unfold before you.

VEGETARIAN OPTION

I'm a meat eater and not often looking for a vegetarian treat, but every so often the Portabella Sandwich at Amante's Pizzeria is exactly what I crave. Their bread is like no other, sort of a mix of sourdough and pizza dough. With plenty of oil and vinegar, this sandwich is great cold or hot.

FANCY MEAL

Every time I eat at Lantern in Chapel Hill, I feel like I've just had the best meal of my life. This is definitely a more upscale option and everything on the menu is delicious and fresh. The whole fried fish is always a great treat and the pork tenderloin is an enormous primal slab of meat that is chop-stick tender. The menu changes seasonally and the appetizers are all amazing, especially the local pickle plate. Sit at the bar, enjoy a signature Lantern cocktail and get a couple appetizers. You won't be sorry.

N.C. BBQ

You're in North Carolina and there is no better time to school yourself on the wonder that is N.C. barbecue. First of all, barbecue is a noun. It is a very specific type of pulled or chopped pork shoulder and N.C. style comes with a vinegar-based sauce. I like the traditional wood-fire method of Allen & Son, just north of Chapel Hill on Hwy. 86 (not the one near Pittsboro - they don't use wood). Allen & Son is the most traditional barbecue experience in the area. Get the BBQ plate with a side of fried okra and some sweet tea and you will be in hog heaven. The Barbecue Joint does an excellent job as well. Their sides are a little more adventurous and change seasonally. Their brussels sprouts are one of my favorite dishes.

CARRBURITOS

This perpetual Carrboro favorite is very convenient to Cat's Cradle and has amazing California-style burritos. All the fillings are great; the chicken or the carnitas are my faves. The flour chips and chipotle salsa round out the meal.

BURGER

Margaret's Cantina, in Timberlyne Shopping Center on the north end of Chapel Hill, specializes in a southwestern/Mexican-style of dining. As expected, the margaritas are great. What's unexpected is their burgers are better. This is the best burger in town.

WELCOME TO MERGEBORO



SUPERCHUNK

OK, maybe calling our little town Mergeboro is a little over the top. But come the last couple of weeks of July, you may start believing the moniker is appropriate.

And if you were around five years ago for Merge Records' 15th anniversary celebration, you might remember the packed shows and the odd sight of various stars of the indie rock universe wandering around town looking for coffee or thumbing through the offerings at local record stores and book shops.

Now, with an even bigger milestone approaching, chances are good that if you're out and about on or around the last weekend of the month, you'll run into a pacer or two of musicians and music fans roaming the streets of this old mill town.

That is entirely appropriate, because in the early days Carrboro was the label's home base. In the early '90s, if you popped into Merge headquarters above where Roulette is now, it was a somewhat sleepy and under air-conditioned spot with occasional bursts of frenzy whenever a new record was ready to be shipped.

Then, Merge was down the hall from the Mammoth Records' art department and across the street from Mammoth's headquarters. At the time, between the two labels, a couple of booking agents, the Cradle and a few other music-related businesses, Carrboro was a legitimate dot on the map of music towns.

Then Merge moved to comfier and roomier offices in a house off Fordham Boulevard in Chapel Hill, and then, as it grew more successful, on to downtown Durham, where the label was able to buy a building to call its own. Mammoth grew larger and was eventually swallowed by a major label and shut down. The support businesses faded away, and now only the Cradle and other clubs remain as thriving reminders that this place loves it some indie rock. That is especially evident every time a Merge band comes to town and the locals come out to represent.

So it's a bit of a homecoming that we'll experience this month, when more than 30 bands and a few hundred music lovers from elsewhere make their way to town.

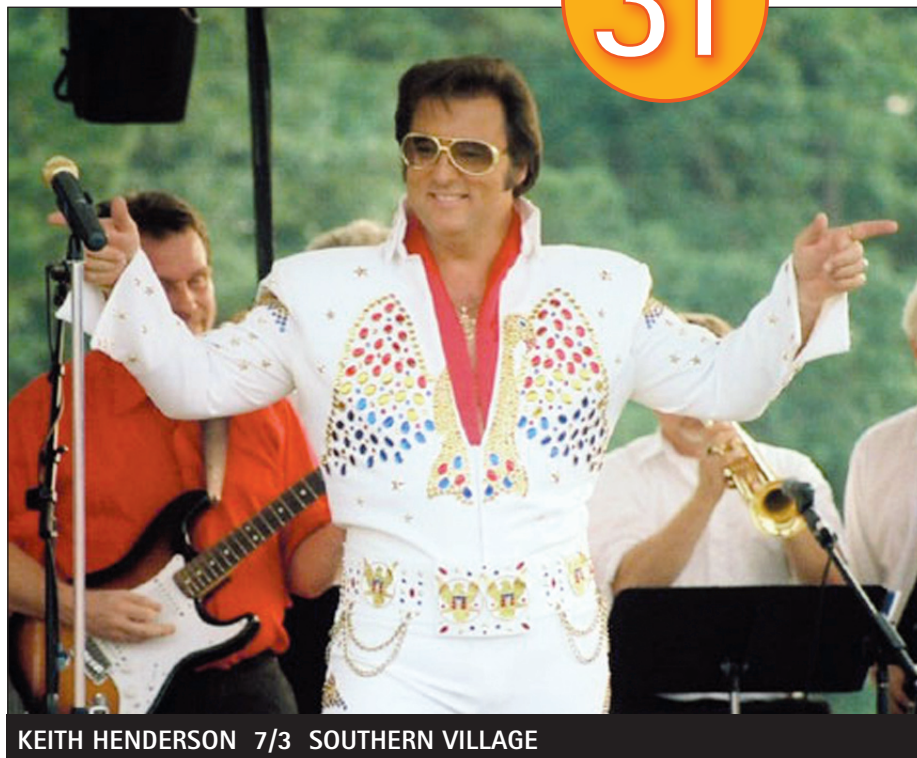

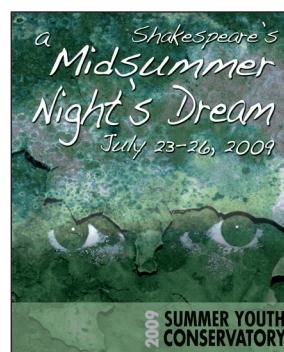

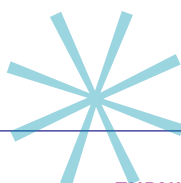

Rising water, hurricane parties and a runaway pit bull

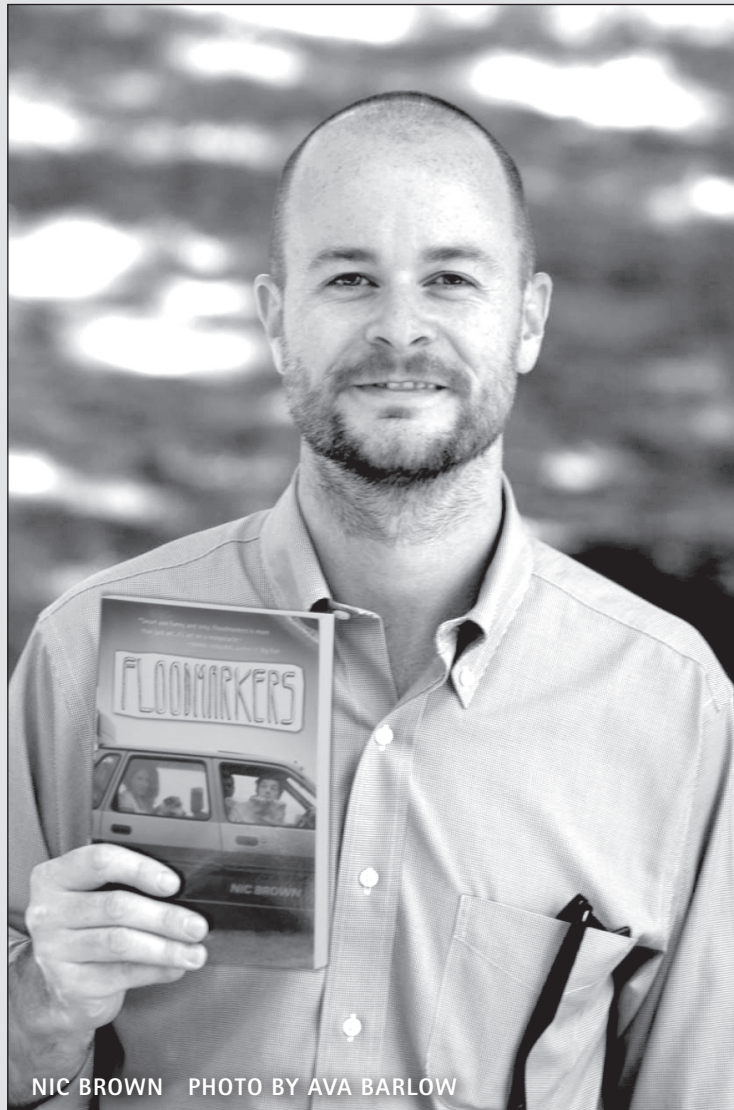
Chapel Hill's Nic Brown might be the only writer around who sees the sale of his first book, *Floodmarkers*, as "the second-best thing that happened to me that day." Given that Brown had also just completed the first draft of his second book (*Doubles*), he felt like one lucky guy on the day his first child, a daughter, arrived.

That kind of luck, though, comes only on the heels of hard work. Years of it. The stories in *Floodmarkers* had their genesis in Brown's time at the Iowa Writer's Workshop, which he entered after graduating from Columbia in 2003. A hybrid of a short-story collection and a novel, *Floodmarkers* tells what happens to the residents of Lystra, a fictional North Carolina town, over the course of a single day – a day when Hurricane Hugo has been predicted to hit town.

The collection originated with Brown's idea of a set of stories linked both by the imminent arrival of a major storm and by a wandering white dog. Its many characters include a funeral-haunting widow, an aspiring actor (who sculpts his 6-inch Mohawk with cherry Jell-O), a teenager whose initiation into the mysteries of sex comes from his female cousin, a child-molesting veterinarian and a gospel-singing school bus driver with a pregnant girlfriend.

Though these folks may sound like the eccentrics who commonly populate stories about small-town Southern life, readers should know that Brown doesn't deal in caricatures. His characters are complex, and they don't behave predictably. The action's always a bit surprising, and even the storm doesn't play out the way it's expected to.

The writing in *Floodmarkers* is tight and spare, in part because of Brown's conviction that his readers are intelligent and will get what he's trying to say without a lot of explanation. It's also carefully crafted, much as he crafted musical arrangements in his years as a professional drummer. Brown's evident compassion for all his characters makes us like them, too, and care what happens

to them which all combines to make *Floodmarkers* a most compelling read.

Floodmarkers will make its literary debut on July 7. You can get a preview, though, at The Cave in Chapel Hill on July 3 at 10 p.m., when Brown's reading will be accompanied by music from his friend Snuzz. And if 10
