D-OGS MEETING FOR APRIL 2017

The April 5 meeting will be held at 7:00pm at the OWASA Community Meeting Room at 440 Jones Ferry Road, Carrboro NC. It will be presented by D-OGS VP David McCorkle. David's topic will be "*Interpreting North Carolina Land Records*".

There are many different types of land records that can be helpful for genealogists: deeds, patents, warrants, land entries, caveats, processions, ejectments, tax lists, and others. This lecture will give an overview of what they are, where to find them both online and offline, and what kind of information you can find.

David grew up in Charlotte, and after graduating from UNC-Chapel Hill in 1979 he remained in the Triangle area working in the software industry. He currently owns and operates a small software company in Cary, and manages to squeeze in genealogy and local history in his spare time. All ancestral lines on his father's side were present in what is now Union County, NC by the early 1800s, some as early as the 1750s, and almost all remained there until the 1920s. Two lines, Trawick and Thomas, were briefly in Wake County in the late 1700s.

HOW ACCURATE ARE DNA KITS USED FOR TESTING ANCESTRY?

Millions of people are purchasing and using home DNA kits to determine their ancestry. The television program *Inside Edition* enlisted the help of two sets of identical triplets and one set of identical quadruplets to investigate the accuracy of the at-home tests. The ancestry of each group should be absolutely identical since they all came from the same egg.

Test kits from 23andMe, FamilyTree DNA, and AncestryDNA were used.

The results are surprising.

The medical experts were confused and disappointed because of the varied results. Does this indicate that some of our beliefs about DNA are wrong?

CHANGES BEING MADE AT THE LDS FAMILY HISTORY LIBRARY

At the FamilySearch luncheon at [RootsTech 2017](#) Diane Loosle presented "*Who Moved My Microfilm: The Truth Behind the Library You Have Always Loved.*" Diane is the FamilySearch Salt Lake Family History Library director and is senior vice president of FamilySearch patron services.

Diane pointed out that old processes like mercury treatment, lobotomy, and bloodletting have died. Old products are displaced. As change happens we have to adapt. She showed a graph of the decrease over time of visitors to the Family History Library and observed that none of us want the library to die.

She has heard a number of rumors about the Family History Library:

- You have to come to Salt Lake City.
- You're closing because everything is going digital.
- You're throwing out books.
- You don't have expertise in the library anymore.
- You don't care about researchers anymore.

"These are so not true," Diane said. "Let me just share what really is going on."

The library regularly seeks feedback from users and adjusts accordingly. They have added photo scanners, microfilm scanners, book scanners, and slide scanners. They provide services to visiting family history societies. (See [Familysearch.org/locations/library_group_visits](https://familysearch.org/locations/library_group_visits).) They have added

rooms which societies, family reunions, and groups can reserve: five computer labs, a 60 or 120-seat auditorium, and a video conference room.

“We love our books,” Diane said. Back 120 years ago as the Genealogical Society of Utah, FamilySearch started collecting books. The library continues to add books. In the past two years they have added 5,376 books, enough to fill 450 feet of shelf space. Stacked, that would be taller than [the Church](#) Office Building (the tall building a block East of the library). The library runs out of space and have to place books in long-term storage.

FamilySearch is digitizing the books you use at the library. They started with family histories. You should consult family histories to see what research has already been done. You can do every-word searches on digitized family histories, even if the original had no index. They are digitizing serials and periodicals. Access the digitized books at [Books.familysearch.org](#) [although you must be at the library to access copyrighted books]. The online collection, which has grown to over 330,000 books, includes books from significant genealogical book collections from across the United States.

FamilySearch is digitizing the microfilm you use at the library. “Microfilm is a dying technology,” Diane said. “We’re going to have to make some changes there.” Access the digitized microfilm at [FamilySearch.org](#). Search the FamilySearch catalog to find digitized microfilm.

The library has substantial expertise via paid and volunteer staff. (See slides, below.) To give you access to experts without wasting time waiting in line, the library has implemented a pager system. Average wait time is five minutes. Last year expert library staff presented 282 webinars. For more information or to watch a previous webinar, visit https://familysearch.org/wiki/en/Family_History_Library_Classes_and_Webinars.

“We feel responsible to make sure everyone can discover and find out about their heritage,” Diane said. “The expert in anything was once a beginner.” Consequently, the library has built a discovery floor designed to engage a new group of people in family history. The library is planning future adjustments because of patron feedback. Expert patrons would like a quicker path to the library expert, so they are working on a *fast path* system (think Disneyland *fast pass*). Some patrons would like noise-free zones, so they will work to provide that.

“I don’t want you to ever have to come to Salt Lake because it’s the only place you can get a resource. I want to get that resource to you where ever you are,” Diane said. “But I want you to want to come to Salt Lake to the Family History Library...to have a really wonderful experience.”

What you should know:

- TreeSync will be replaced by Software MacKiev's FamilySync™. In the new FamilySync, Ancestry's search, merge, and Ancestry hints will all work as they do now for users who sync with their Ancestry trees and you can also look forward to more exciting new improvements.
- FamilySync will be available only in Software MacKiev's Family Tree Maker 2017 edition, which will be released on March 31, 2017.

The upgrade is free for all users who purchased a copy of a MacKiev Family Tree Maker edition since March 1, 2016. Those with previous Ancestry editions, or who got a free copy of Family Tree Maker 2014.1 or Mac 3.1, are eligible for discounted upgrades. The pre-order upgrade is \$29.95 for those who sign up for Software MacKiev's mailing list before March 29 and the upgrade will continue to be a discounted price (\$39.95) for a limited time after March 29.

- Between Wednesday, March 29 and Friday, March 31, there will be a short period where syncing functionality may be interrupted as Software MacKiev rolls out their new syncing technology.
- As of March 29, 2017, Ancestry will no longer be supporting TreeSync, given the introduction of Software MacKiev's FamilySync™. FIND YOUR PC'S ORIGINAL WINDOWS PRODUCT KEY

(Editor's note - So many of us are using computers to find, record and preserve our family history that we often forget how important it is to take proper care of this device and the data recorded there. This article will tell you how to find and save the original Windows Product Key that you might need later if you ever need to rebuild your computer or re-install your Windows version 8, 8.1, 10 or later operating system. Copy these commands EXACTLY, LETTER FOR LETTER. Otherwise, it will not work properly. I suggest that you *Cut and Paste* rather than typing the command - *Richard*)

If you've purchased a new PC with Windows pre-installed in the past few years, you might have noticed a few changes on the outside of the device.

The biggest change is the absence of a product key, which was included on the holographic Certificate of Authenticity (COA) sticker with PCs that came pre-installed with Windows 7 or earlier versions.

Beginning with Windows 8, that information is no longer on a COA but is instead embedded in the BIOS. If you re-install the same version of Windows that came with your PC, it should activate automatically.

If you want to record that product key so that you can restore Windows later, it's easy enough to do. Open a PowerShell window and issue this command:

`(Get-WmiObject -query 'select * from SoftwareLicensingService').OA3xOriginalProductKey`

If you see no output that means your system does not include the Windows key in the BIOS, as is often the case with home-built PCs, devices built by a System Builder OEM, or those that were originally sold with a Windows 10 license.

Network administrators who manage licensing using Key Management Services can get details about PCs on the network using a different set of options for the same PowerShell command. To view all details about a machine's current licensing status, use this command:

`Get-WMIObject -Class SoftwareLicensingService | Select-Object -Property *`

(Be sure to include the asterisk at the end of that command.)

To save the key, click in the PowerShell window, drag the mouse pointer across the entire 25-character key, and then right-click. Although nothing appears to happen, your selection has actually been copied to the Clipboard. Paste it into a text file and save it in a safe place.

Unofficial Ancestry.com Workbook- A How-To Manual for Tracing Your Family Tree on the #1 Genealogy Website

By Nancy Hendrickson. Published by Family Tree Books. 2016. 191 pages.

In leafing through the pages of this workbook, a variation on an old commercial came to mind:

Subscribing to Ancestry.....199 dollars.

Finding that elusive record.....priceless.

This is a workbook that could be very useful when you're working and poking around on Ancestry. It's filled with guidance on navigating the various tabs and links in order to get the most out of Ancestry. There are examples of records you'll find, the various dialog boxes you'll come across, sidebars containing explanatory text and image graphics to present clues and hints for your searches, and worksheets that are nicely formatted for recording your data. There are links for downloading more copies of the worksheets, nicely avoiding copyright infringement.

I've always had trouble, bumbling through the Search procedures of the genealogy-research web sites. The very first chapter in the workbook addresses this issue, ably covering how-to-get-to-what-you-want topics, along with a very nice (and thoroughly helpful) description of the Card Catalog, which contains an extensive list of the Ancestry collections. So within the first chapter, in my opinion, the book has paid for itself. The Card Catalog is probably little used and dismissed, to a researcher's detriment. This chapter reminds us why we do not want to skip over the Card Catalog.

The next chapters cover Census Records; Birth, Marriage and Death Records; Military Records; Immigration Records; Historical Maps, Images, Newspapers, and Publications; Social History; Ancestry DNA; and appendices of useful quick links, checklists, worksheets, and forms.

Each chapter begins with instructional material, followed by exercises to help you practice the guidance notes, consider some new ideas in search strategy, and concluding key point summaries.

I have to say that the graphics are rather faded, lacking in contrast, which would make it hard to deal with if you were working at home in the evening relying on normal house lamp-light. But the graphics are numerous and do illustrate very well the key points in the accompanying text.

The content is undoubtedly going to help you navigate Ancestry. Beginners and advancers alike will uncover nuggets of information that cause one to be astonished as what one missed all these months of research.

This workbook is targeted specifically for Ancestry, of which there are a few users out there who are reading this article today. So it's definitely a first-rate reference manual for ferreting out the hidden gems within the records collections, and a handy-dandy method of keeping your work organized.

This would be a great way to maximize your Ancestry membership, beginners and advanced users alike.

Priceless.

Who wrote "The Gambler" for Kenny Rogers and lived in a mill house on Ninth Street? Where does Coach K get his haircut? Where did Elvis sleep incognito, in a caboose? Where was Kevin Costner spotted in his boxer shorts, near East Campus? Why do neighborhoods change so quickly in Durham? Come along and find out..

Three-mile loop starts at Ninth & Green, across from White Star Laundry.

We'll start with the South Ellerbe Creek Nature Area and continue through an old mill village. We'll see an old liquor house, Buck Dean's bungalow, a Sears House and a quiet urban garden in Old West Durham. We'll then continue into the Watts-Hillandale neighborhood and walk past Oval Park and the old Watts Hospital.

We'll go down a hidden alley and see where a songwriter for Norah Jones, Lou Rawls and Jefferson Airplane was born. We'll head over to Walltown and hear about Duke's original plans to build here. Then we'll go by Richard Nixon's house in Trinity Heights and continue past the homes of Duke's famous faculty and coaches on Buchanan -- including Cap Card, the father of Duke basketball and Wallace Wade, whose bowl games paid for Cameron Indoor Stadium.

We'll go down Watts Street, past Trinity Park, and see where Mr. Costner was filmed in his boxers in Bull Durham. Then we'll head across East Campus to Ninth Street, past Erwin Cotton Mills and back to where we started.

You'll see a little nature and learn some Durham history on the route. We'll also talk about urban trees and the ridge, between the Neuse and Cape Fear basins, that forms the backbone of our town. We might even get into current events in the Bull City and talk about all this development.

Local history lover John Schelp will narrate along the way. No need to register. Parking is available on streets near Ninth & Green. (Bike racks are also nearby.)

Hike takes about three hours (but folks can peel off anytime.) Optional post-tour gathering at Dain's Place at 754 Ninth Street -- for a cold drink and further conversation.
