Yow's book about Smith paints a fresh picture of Chapel Hill from 1936 through the early 1970s (Smith died Nov. 7, 1973). Smith knew about Chapel Hill because Frederick Koch, then chair of the dramatic arts program at the university, had been an early student of the Yale professor she had learned under. Koch's department had earned national acclaim for the statewide people's theater movement he created. She also knew that Paul Green, a philosophy professor who had won a Pulitzer in 1927 for Abraham's Bosom, taught in the drama program. While touring with a Federal Theater group that performed in Raleigh, she took the bus to Chapel Hill and brazenly (for the day) approached Koch, who called Green into the meeting, where both men agreed to pursue grants that would allow Smith to work for the Federal Theater Project at the University of North Carolina.

A few months later, Smith returned from New York by train with her youngest daughter, Mary, who asked her mother how long they would stay here.

Yow writes, "Betty replied, 'Forever.' And so she did: this was the town where Betty Smith lived the second half of her life."

Smith's life would shine the spotlight on her adopted hometown, bring a movie premiere to Franklin Street on May 5, 1965, when Joy in the Morning (adapted from her fourth book) opened, and provide fodder for gossips.

It was another Betty — Betty Hodges — former literary editor for the Durham Herald, who suggested that Yow write about Smith. Hodges had also suggested the first book Yow wrote about a woman writer, a book published in 1999 about Bernice Kelly Harris. "I loved the research and writing that biography," Yow said.

And so it became with the seven-year Smith experience.

"I was reluctant at first to write about this feisty, black-haired novelist," Yow said. "But I read her three novels and read Tree again." The resonance led Yow to research, where she found plenty of documents in the Wilson Library and many people who knew Smith and wanted to talk about her.

"She wrote Tree in Chapel Hill," Yow said. "I think she needed the ambience of Chapel Hill."

Meet Yow and hear readings from the book at 7 p.m., Jan. 17 at Market Street Books in Southern Village. She will also read at McIntyre's Fine Books at 7 p.m.


