5K Run: This event is part of the celebration of the Haliwa-Saponi 54th Annual Pow-Wow. It will take place on April 20, 2019 at 7:00 a.m. at the Multi-Purpose Building "Library" at 228 Capps Farm Road, Hollister, NC. All entrants will receive an official time and be eligible for awards. The entry fee is \$25 through March 31st, which includes a T-shirt, after that it will cost \$30.00 and no t-shirt will be included. Awards will be given to the 1st and 2nd place winners overall, male and female. Awards will also be given to the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place winners in the following age groups; 1-10, 11-15, 16-19, 20-29, 30-39, 40-49, 50-59, 60-69, 70 and over. Late entrants may register and pre-registered entrants can pick up their packets on Friday April 19, 2019 from 5-7 p.m. at the Multi-Purpose Building at 228 Capps Farm Road in Hollister, NC. I provided an empowering presentation about our federal acknowledgment journey, while our guest speaker Lance A. Gumbs, Senior Trustee of the Shinnecock Indian Nation and Northeast Regional Vice-President of the National Congress of the American Indians gave a moving speech about the importance and challenges of federal acknowledgment. Participants enjoyed the music of Head Rush and contributed monetarily through both a silent and open auction. The evening was capped off by a pledge of \$1,000.00 a month by Eli Hammad. His pledge serves as a challenge to tribal citizens and other supporters to step up and help sustain our project. Federal recognition is an obtainable and deserving goal for our people. Our ancestors fought hard to achieve public and state recognition, but federal recognition was their ultimate goal. We are still taking donations and pledges and will provide more opportunities to contribute in the future. 
