SPOTLIGHT ON HISTORY

One source of information about early Smithville (Southport) residents is the records of St. James Episcopal Church in Wilmington. St. James was the sister church of St. Philips at Brunswick Town, while the present St. Philips in Southport was established in 1843.

The following excerpts are from St. James Church Historical Records, 1737 - 1852, compiled by Ida Brooks Kellam and Elizabeth F. McKoy.

- Maj. Samuel Spott to Miss Harriet A.S. Clitherall Smithville, 14 Oct. 1828
- John H. Holmes to Caroline A. Cochrane Smithville, 21 Aug. 1838
- Robert G. Rankin & Susan A. Brown Smithville, 27 April 1842
- Capt. George Taylor to Emeline Everett Smithville 7 May 1844
- Capt. Sewell L. Fremont, USA to Mary E. Langdon Smithville, April ____ 1848
- Philip Prioleau to Caroline E. Brown Smithville, 5 October 1848

Funerals:

- 1835 July 24 Lieut. Palmer Smithville Intemperance
- 1836 August 23 George Platt, age 6 Smithville nervous fever
- 1844 November 14 Ann Eliza Childs at Ft. Johnston, Smithville
- 1844 December 17 Mrs. Dr. Sutton Smithville
