do with as they need,” Winecker said. Hopefully this fundraiser will help them bridge those gaps.

“We hope to expand the Bynum Front Porch activities and begin providing scholarships,” said longtime resident and board member, Luke Barrow (looking very much like a game show host in his frilly tux shirt). “The idea started this spring to give one or two scholarships for a Chatham County high school student who wants to major in the arts, and one for a Chatham County AVID student. It’s our long-term goal to endow those two scholarships.”

There’s plenty of room for providing tons of fun while supplying the funding. Besides a buffet table filled with bounty from the General Store Café, every advance ticket buyer receives \$1,000 worth of chips for spending during the evening of blackjack, craps, roulette and Texas hold’em.

True to Vegas entertainment, there will be music, a magician and an Elvis

impersonator, all sure to please.

After fun and games, chips can be exchanged for raffle tickets that offer many prizes, including a flat-screen TV. Every \$100 worth of chips equals one ticket.

“If you stink at gambling and want to buy more chips, \$20 will buy \$1,000 worth,” Barrow said. And no matter what, any money spent will not be lost at this gambling venue.

Local businesses, including BB&T, which recently opened a new branch in Pittsboro, Hope Crossing Animal Clinic, Aria Skin and Laser Spa and Edward Jones Investment have stepped up to the plate to insure that the fun folds into profits for two of Chatham’s most active nonprofits.

A cash bar and shuttle service from Pittsboro Trek Express (for a fee) complete the occasion.

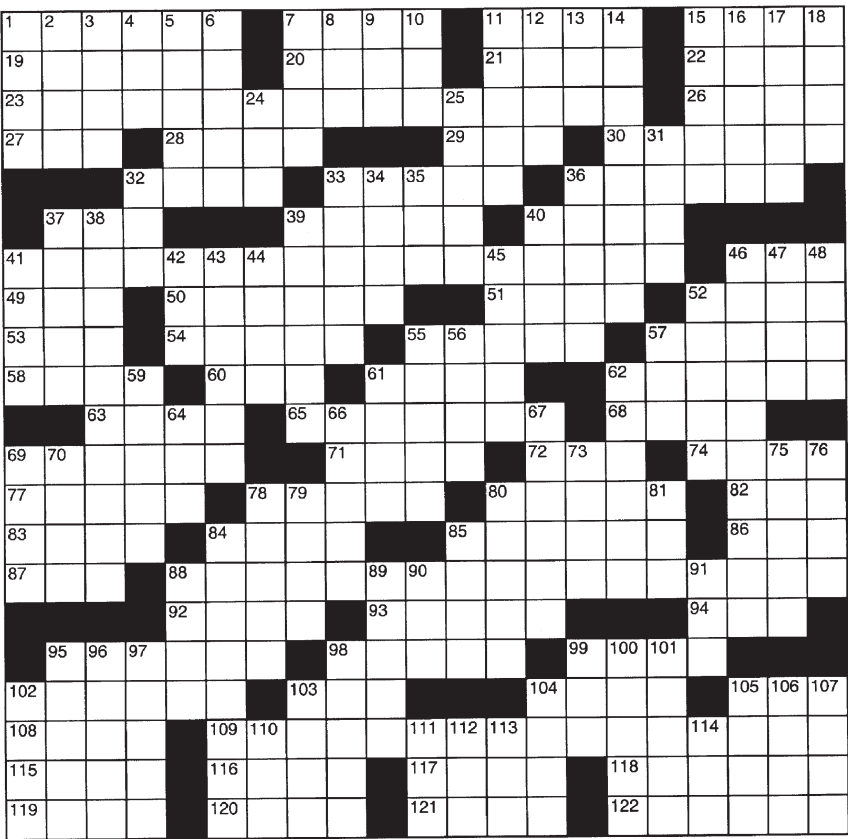
