A Gentle Lady Coming Soon!

In a few weeks you will have a chance to meet someone who was dear to someone who is dear to all of us. Lelia Jane Sellers lived in

Southport for 50 years, from 1920 to 1970, during which her accomplishments included giving birth to our "Miss Susie Sellers Carson."

Co-authored by Miss Susie and Larry Maisel, Lelia Jane; A Very Gentle Lady, weaves together Lelia Jane Sellers' life and what was happening in Southport and Brunswick County in that half-century.


The book is the result of something over 16 hours of interviews which Larry did with Miss Susie, and therefore is largely reminiscences of her mother, the Sellers family, and both their quiet times and some adventures, told in her words. There are a few surprises, one of which shows that, while her mother may have been a very gentle lady, in her childhood, our Miss Susie wasn't always gentle, particularly in one incident with her sister, **Thelma!**

The book provides a look at not only her mother's early life in Supply and near Holden Beach, but how Southport families dealt with the Great Depression, two world wars, and the thriving business community now long gone. From accident-prone Susie to floating slabs of bacon, this latest publication by the Southport Historical Society will make for interesting reading.

Now we need more and more of you to join us in this exciting undertaking (no pun intended!). Consider these ways you might become involved and let us hear from you. **Musette** will be happy to answer any general questions, so give her a call at 454-0437 or one of the following for more specific details.

Adopt-a-Plot is the method by which a clean-up volunteer will have the opportunity to maintain a specific plot year-round by keeping it free of weeds, leaves, and wind-blown trash. We are permitted only to *maintain* the plots, not to *enhance* them. This will be further explained should you choose to become a caretaker. After working a couple of times during our workdays several people have already selected their favorite plot. **Trudy** and **Kathy**, our curators, seem to be kin to or know about every family represented there, so they

keep us on track as to which plots are "adoptable" and which are still maintained by family members. Call **Dinah** at 454-4068 for details about adopting a plot.

Restoration and conservation of the stones seem to be foremost in the mind of the general public. **Marvin** has met with the superintendent of the historic Oakdale Cemetery in Wilmington, Eric Kozen. Eric has actually repaired many of Oakdale's markers which were vandalized. He is willing to come meet with our volunteers and train us for on-the-spot restoration. 
113 E. Bay Street - Capt. J.J. Adkins House


A Series Featuring Southport Homes by Larry Maisel

Capt. Adkins View Got Better

There are not many houses on Bay Street that don't have a great view of the water, but one owned by Capt. J. J. Adkins, a river pilot, got even better around 1900.

His home at 113 E. Bay Street began as a one-story structure, not unlike the Taylor house which is next door. Look closely and you can see the similarity. The Adkins house was built in the latter part of the 1800s, What is interesting is that the second story covered all but the front room





J. J. Adkins was an active fellow and just before the Spanish-American War he was one of several men involved in getting guns into Cuba for use by the patriot rebels there.

The society sponsors the Plaque Program that provides plaques for homes in Southport that are at least 75 years old and meet other qualifications. From the Chronicles . .

The society has published a set of four chronologies edited by Bill Reaves that cover happenings in Smithville/ Southport from 1520 to 1970. Fascinating reading! A limited number of these sets are now on sale for \$25. They are

January 10, 1826: General Benjamin Smith, former Governor of North Carolina, died at Smithville. Formerly a large landowner and prime benefactor of the State University, in his last years he livied in poverty.

January 1848: James A. Mason purchased the old "Benjamin Smith Mansion", occupied by Governor Ed-

ward Dudley as a summer residence, and converted it to a hostelry called "Mason's Hotel".

February 1761: Colonial Governor Arthur Dobbs issued an order when he learned that King George III had ascended the throne that "the militia be drawn out and a triple discharge from Fort Johnston of 21 guns and from all the ships in the river."

February 28, 1864: The famous U.S. Navy Lieutenant William B. Cushing made a daring raid o Smithville. An attempt was made to capture General Herbert, but fortunately the general was in Washington. An engineer officer was captured in his stead and taken to Cushing's vessel, the "Monticello".

February 1903: Ready for Tourists—"With good lights on our streets, a deep well of pure water, our streets and sidewalks repaired and improved, to which we may add a cool and refreshing sea breeze, fresh from the Atlantic Ocean at all times, Southport can throw open her doors of welcome to the visitors next summer."

March 12, 1875: A debating society was organized for the benefit of the young men of Smithville

March 13, 1880: The ladies of Smithville, to the number of 100 or more, sent a petition to the county commissioners asking them to prohibit the sale of liquors in that town, and an election for a "Wet" or "Dry" ticket was ordered to be held.

March 1915: The Southport Board of Aldermen signed a contract for the construction of a water and sewer system for the city.

March 29th Program . .



Historical Trail Signs . . .

For the past three years the Southport Historical Society (SHS) has participated in a community-wide committee which applies for grants and designs and produces signs about Southport history. Funding for this project is from the NC Department of Natural Resources and its State Parks and Recreation Department program. \$15,000 has been approved for projects in Southport. Signs are erected near specific historical or ecological locations. Many signs are located along the Southport River Walk and others at locations throughout town.



Photos and a brief history on each sign explain the story or importance of the site. Initial signs dealt specifically with such sites as the Cape Fear River, the Salt Marsh, Battery Island, the fishing industry, the T.M. Thompson house and the river pilots. Last year all the signs focused on Southport history and included sites such as: the Old Jail, the Burying Ground and the Brunswick County Training School. Currently an additional eight signs are being designed and are expected to be installed in late May or early June. Some of these signs focus on the crab factory and shrimp industry, black businesses and churches, the old railroad, and Franklin Square Park.



The SHS brochure, Southport Trail, A Self-Guided Walking Tour, includes a map of Southport, information about historic buildings and places of interest and identifies all of the historical markers with asterisks. It is available for residents and visitors at the Visitors Center. Why not take a few friends on the tour and get them interested in joining the society—"OPPORTUNITY KNOCKING!"
