
D-OGS MEETING FOR 15 AUGUST 2018

SOUTH CAROLINA DEPARTMENT OF ARCHIVES AND HISTORY ANNOUNCES DIGITIZATION OF OVER 11,000 REVOLUTIONARY WAR RECORDS

The following announcement was written by the South Carolina Department of Archives and History (SCDAH):

S108902, SUMTER, THOMAS, ACCOUNT AUDITED (FILE NO. 7538) OF CLAIMS GROWING OUT OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Columbia, S.C. – The South Carolina Department of Archives and History (SCDAH) is pleased to announce that the records series “Accounts Audited of Claims Growing out of the Revolution in South Carolina 1775-1856” is now active and images are available on the Online Records Index. This record consists of 11,170 documents presented by citizens to the treasury in support of claims for military service, supplies, and other contributions rendered during the latter part of the Revolutionary War. Most of the files contain an auditor’s cover paper, which includes the name of claimant, a brief description of their service provided, and the amount of their claim and its adjusted value. Additionally, if an indent was issued, its number and the claimant’s signature verifying its receipt were also included as well as receipts and affidavits to the validity of the claim.

Over the last six months, the SCDAH completed the process of adding these records to the Online Records Index. Our greatest appreciation goes to the Southern Revolutionary War Institute and Mr. Michael Scoggins for providing the images to the agency. Mr. Scoggins was instrumental in having the images scanned through a grant funded to the Southern Revolutionary War Institute from the National Park Service. Scoggins is the historian for the Culture & Heritage Museums in York County and research director of the Southern Revolutionary War Institute. This series is one of the most requested records series at the SCDAH. Records such as audited accounts are vital resources for genealogists and historians. Having a series as valuable and expansive available in a digital format is a milestone for any individual with South Carolina ancestry.



NOW IT’S EASY TO PUBLISH YOUR FAMILY HISTORY IN AN ELECTRONIC BOOK WITH GEDCOM PUBLISHER

John Cardinal is well-known for the excellent software products and services he has created, including the genealogy hosting service, [Family History Hosting](#), and his products that produce web pages for personal genealogy web sites: [Second Site](#) and [GedSite](#). Now he has a new product that produces electronic books

(ebooks) containing the results of your family history research. These ebooks can be read on most ebook readers, such as an iPad, as well as on Windows and Macintosh computers. Here is the announcement:




“Digital publishing is very popular,” said John Cardinal, CEO and Founder of Family History Hosting, “and it’s likely that when our grandchildren mature, most if not all their reading will be e-books, not paper books. That’s why we should create family histories using electronic books.”

An electronic book (or e-book) is a book made available in digital form. E-books are easy to share and update, and they are more flexible than paper books. Readers can carry hundreds of e-books with them on their device of choice, including smartphones, tablets, and dedicated reading devices like Kindles and Nooks. Readers can adjust the font size to make reading easier on the eyes, and links in the text help them navigate to sections of interest. Text search commands make it easy to find specific names, words, or phrases.

You may insert biographies from your genealogy database into your book by choosing people one at a time, or by entering criteria to select multiple people. The biographies are called person entries.

In addition to the information drawn from your genealogy project, you can add other content to your book, including text and images. You can link from narrative text to person entries in the book and add source citations where Gedcom Publisher manages the footnote numbers for you.



E-books are a great choice for archiving the fruits of your genealogy research project. E-books never go out of print because they aren't printed at all. E-books are contained in a single data file, so they are easy to share. Send a copy to family members or other interested researchers, donate your book to archival organizations, or sell it on Amazon - your choice.

Gedcom Publisher is incredibly flexible and includes a GEDCOM reader that handles GEDCOM variations from popular genealogy programs. It also reads TMG project databases.

Pensions Are a Better Bet

While genealogists usually want every record they can get, remember that in terms of potential information, military benefit records (pensions, bounty land applications, etc.) tend to have more details about the applicant and his family. Service records may document when your ancestor was mustered in and out, physical characteristics, etc.

Benefit records may provide significantly more detail about the applicant and his family--especially if his widow applied for a pension. She would have had to document his service and her relationship to the veteran.

If you've only focused on the service, locate the pension record. There may be more detail than you imagined.

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Thrown In At the End of the Year

When searching chronological entries of baptisms in a church register, always look through the entire year--even when you are certain of the date.

The chance you are incorrect is not the only reason for doing this. Some pastors or priests would record baptisms for children born out of wedlock at the end of all the entries for the year, thus separating the entries. If you look for it "exactly where it is supposed to be," you may miss the desired entry--even if you have the date correct.

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Why the In-Laws of My Uncle Matter

When relationship details in records are scant, every record matters and researching the entire "group," (even non-relatives) is important. Arvin Butler appears in records in New York, Ontario, and Michigan in the 19th century. Showing I have the "same guy" in various locations is difficult--unique names are not always sufficient.

Arvin in some of those locations is living near a man named Rufus Stephens--likely father-in-law of Arvin's probable brother Benjamin who was also living near Arvin in some of those locations. The close proximity of Arvin Butler and Rufus Stephens in more than one state and time period makes it more likely I have the same Arvin.

If I ignore Rufus because he's Arvin's brother's father-in-law, I may miss knowing I have the same guy.

Those neighbors matter--especially when the neighbors are the same from one state to another.

Military and civilian reenactors will set up displays on the old Fort Fisher airstrip and discuss the life of World War II soldiers, Marines, and loved ones on the home front. Also discussed will be the amazing stories of military women who played a vital role in the march toward victory. The program will include tours, military weapon demonstrations, and special guest speakers. Kids of all ages will also enjoy the Toy Soldier workshop, a family activity at which participants paint toy soldiers and learn about military uniforms and equipment. General admission is free, but there may be a small charge for some tours, and for a small donation, visitors can also ride in an authentic World War II jeep.

Saturday's speaker schedule is as follows: At 11 am, Paul Peebles of the US Marine Corps Historical Company, will present about the Marines at Camp Lejeune, Montfort Point and the Women Marines during World War II. At 1 pm, Stormi Souter-Brown will present "This is My War Too" a discussion of the contributions of the Women's Army Corps soldiers (WACs) at North Carolina bases and to the Allied powers on all fronts. At 3 pm, Cliff Tyndall will discuss the history and role of Camp Davis and Fort Fisher. On Sunday at 12:30 pm, Cliff Tyndall will speak again and at 2:30 pm, John Moseley will discuss the Women Army Service Pilots (WASPs) at Camp Davis and Fort Fisher. All presentations are free and open to the public and will be held in the Spencer Theater.

All Fort Fisher programming is made possible by the Friends of Fort Fisher, its sustaining members, and from generous support from New Hanover County, the town of Carolina Beach, and the town of Kure Beach.
