

Title VI Indian Education Program

On September 18, 2018, a record-breaking 168 people came together to celebrate education and heritage. The Back to School Pow-wow is a collaborative between the Haliwa-Saponi Youth Initiative and Title VI Indian Education Programs that first began in 2016. The purpose was to celebrate the beginning of the school year and to bridge the cultural barrier between school educators and the tribal community. This event has been well attended over the past three years and receives an overwhelming amount of support from students, parents, educators, and tribal leaders. It is important because this opens the door for the school & tribal community to interact, as well as the opportunity to show appreciation to those who educate our children within their students' cultural environment. Chief Dr. Ogletree Richardson gave the opening invocation and remarks and Councilman Alfred Morris Richardson carried in the Eagle Staff during grand entry. Councilman Jimmie Silver and Tribal Administrator Archie Lynch gave remarks of encouragement. Teachers were given an honor song in appreciation for their service to our students in the Haliwa-Saponi community. The most important part of this event is the smudging ceremony that is done to offer prayers for a good school year and prosperity in teaching and learning. This year's head staff included Mrs. Sharon Berrun, MC; Mr. Dalton Lynch, Arena Director; Head Dancers, Zianne Richardson - Miss Haliwa-Saponi and Mason Richardson; and the Saponi Nation Drum. This event wouldn't be possible without the hard work and dedication of the Indian Education Program Coordinators and their Parent Committees. Anyone interested in being a part of their school's Indian Education Program Parent Committee should contact their Title VI Indian Education Program Coordinators. Thanks to our tribal council, school staff, volunteers, parents and visitors. We look forward to growing in the future. We will try to have this event at the end of the school year as well.
