

A Fire in My Belly

A little more than a week remains to see David Wojnarowicz's controversial unfinished film A Fire in My Belly at the Ackland Art Museum at UNC.

Wojnarowicz, an artist active in the New York City art scene during the 1980s, made the film in 1986-87, later disassembling the work. He died in 1992, never completing the film.

In October, the Smithsonian National Portrait Gallery in Washington, D.C., included a four-minute version of A Fire in My Belly in an exhibition, but removed the film on Nov. 30 under pressure from the Catholic League and some members of Congress.

Two screens in the Ackland's second-floor study gallery will present Wojnarowicz's original fragments of A Fire in My Belly and the version removed from the National Portrait Gallery. The installation will also include the Catholic League's statement and newspaper articles about the controversy surrounding the film.

The museum will display the installation through Sunday, Feb. 13. Admission to the Ackland, located on South Columbia Street just south of Franklin Street, is free. For more information, call 966-5736 or visit ackland.org
