Chainsaw bandit doesn't get far

An Oklahoma man was arrested for shoplifting after attempting to steal a chainsaw by stuffing it down his pants.

Police said the 21-year-old appeared intoxicated after he took the mechanical saw from the wall of Ross Seed Company and placed down the front of his pants.

The man's subsequent waddling led some employees to believe he was handicapped. But he was eventually chased from the store, at which point he ditched the chainsaw, climbed a tree, scrambled into someone's house, got kicked out and dove headfirst into a creek.

Police fished him from the shallow water and placed him under arrest.
