HOW TO BACK UP GOOGLE PHOTOS TO YOUR COMPUTER

My cell phone is configured to automatically send a copy of every new picture and video to Google Photos where they remain in a hidden area visible only to me. However, copying the same photos to my desktop or laptop computers and then later backing those up to the cloud turned out to be a bit complicated.

NOTE: Instructions on how to back up photos and videos made by Android smartphones may be found at http://bit.ly/2Gqidmz while iPhone/iPad/iPod touch users can find similar instructions for their devices at http://bit.ly/2y7NS7G.

Luckily, Google's Backup and Sync application for computers will copy Google photos to your Windows PC or Macintosh automatically.

The desktop app for files and photos replaces the previous Google Drive app for Windows and Mac and syncs to Google Photos and Google Drive. This change was brought about because of the growing concerns by users over the confusing connection between Google Drive and Google Photos, so Google made changes to simplify the experience.


Now back up your photos and save them in 2, 3, 4, or even more different locations fors safe keeping.

BOOKS OF POSSIBLE INTEREST

Book Review: Grow Your Own Family Tree

Grow Your Own Family Tree by Pauline Golds. Published by *Emerald Publishing*. 2018. 163 pages. This is the second edition of Ms. Golds' book. In her first edition, she focused on research in the British Isles, but in this follow-up edition, she expands her instruction to the United States, Canada, the Caribbean, and Europe.

So contrary to most of the books I receive to review, this one is not U.S.-centric. Its emphasis is on British research.

I would call this a beginner's guidebook. It's not long, so the reader won't become overwhelmed with the task ahead, but Ms. Golds offers words of encouragement that help the apprentice genealogist get going along with hope and expectation that carried us all through our own dark days and nights.

Ms. Golds covers the requisite topics of birth, marriage, and death records, and offers an overview of the British censuses.

Then she covers the historical perspective of British life. She examines the class system and occupations of early English society, the British military, and crime in the Victorian era, the poor laws and the workhouse, death and disease, and education and apprenticeships.

Ms. Golds offers brief overviews of American research, Scotland and Ireland, Canadian research, and Caribbean research.

This is a good book for a Brit asking the question: What would it take to discover my family tree? Ms. Golds provides the answers. Her advice is sound and leaves the reader with a sense of intrigue and possibility.

DESCRIPTION OF WORKSHOPS:

Native American Research: Come learn what resources are available to assist you in your research for your Indian Territory ancestors and gain a deeper understanding for the history of this region. Explore records pertaining to Native Americans, Freedmen, and Intruders living in Indian Territory in the second half of the 19th Century. The case studies presented will focus on Five Civilized Tribes research (Cherokee, Choctaw,

Seminole, & Muscogee Creek), but the strategies can be applied to other tribes as well.

Adoption Research: A historical overview of adoption practices and amended birth certificates in Texas. Attendees will learn the reasons adoptees' birth certificates were altered, hear about search techniques, discover the many problems adult adoptees have with "government-sanctioned falsified documents", and learn why national organizations support equal access to original birth certificates.

HANDS-ON RESEARCH SESSIONS: Each workshop will include a time for individualized help. Bring your research notes and explore the resources you have learned about in each workshop. Work through your own challenges with help from other researchers and the speakers. With practice and experience, you may be able to find new clues about your ancestors' lives or the adoption you are researching.

SPEAKERS' BIOS

Hannah Kubacak ~ Hannah is a Chicasaw citizen who is passionate about genealogy and local history. She is currently the Genealogy Reference Librarian for the Waco-McLennan County Library's Genealogy Center. Previously, Hannah has worked for the Chickasaw Nation at the Holliso Research Center, the UTSA Libraries' Special Collection Department, and McLennan Community College teaching genealogy as continuing education. Her own family research takes her through Texas and Oklahoma as well as the Southeastern United States.

Connie Gray ~ Connie is an adoptee and founder of Texas Adoptee Rights. She entered foster care at the age of three when a state social worker illegally terminated her mother's parental rights. Connie and her sisters were adopted into different families. Upon turning 18 in 1976, she petitioned the Travis County court, obtained her original birth certificate, and within 2 years located her entire biological family. Recognized as a **Spokeo Search Angel** in 2013, she was inducted into G's Adoption Registry Search Angel Hall of Fame in 2018. DNA testing has become a common genealogical tool, and the Facebook Group "Texas DNA and Adoptee Search Support" was created to assist adoptees in identifying their biological families. Connie's primary focus is educating the general public and politicians on the history of adoption in Texas and working to ensure equal access to original birth certificates.

Produced by a Palmer alum, Dr. Eric Winston, this documentary will focus on its founder Dr. Charlotte Hawkins Brown and the students who traveled to this school from all over the United States and even a few foreign countries. This documentary will also highlight the incredible influence the education and experiences this school provided to successful and powerful African American adults.

Information on the Producer - Born and raised in Savannah, Georgia, Dr. Eric V. A. Winston is a retired Vice President of Institutional Advancement at Wilberforce University in Wilberforce, Ohio from 1979-2002 and at Columbia College in Chicago, Illinois from 2005-2013.
