## Governorship retained by Mexico's main leftist party Monday in Guerrero

MEXICO CITY (MCT) — Mexico's main leftist party appeared Monday to have retained the governorship in the southern state of Guerrero, thwarting the former ruling party at the start of a pivotal election cycle.

Angel Aguirre of the leftist Democratic Revolution Party, or PRD, finished 13 points ahead of rival Manuel Anorve in the race for governor, with votes tallied from all but a handful of polling sites.

Both candidates claimed victory soon after polls closed Sunday, capping a bitter campaign marred by mutual accusations of vote fraud, dirty tricks and strong-arm tactics. Campaigning took place as Guerrero, home of the Acapulco beach resort, has been buffeted by a wave of drug violence.

Anorve, of the once-dominant Institutional Revolutionary Party, or PRI, on Monday accused his rivals of waging a "dirty war" and said his party would contest the results.

By winning in Guerrero, the fractious PRD managed to keep political control of the first of three states with PRD governors that have elections scheduled for this year. One of those, Baja California Sur, holds its election Sunday.

The outcome in Guerrero, the first of six states to elect governors in 2011, puts a dent in the PRI's hopes of creating an air of inevitability as it seeks to retake the presidency next year.

The centrist PRI, toppled in 2000 after seven decades of top-to-bottom control, has stormed back by regaining control of the lower Chamber of Deputies and snaring six governorships from rivals since 2007.

The PRI's most likely presidential candidate, Gov. Enrique Pena Nieto of the central state of Mexico, leads polls in hypothetical matchups against opponents from the PRD and President Felipe Calderon's conservative National Action Party.

## Another blow to health care reform

WASHINGTON, D.C. (MCT) — A federal judge in Florida is expected to deal President Barack Obama's health care overhaul another legal blow Monday, ruling that a requirement in the law mandating that most Americans get health insurance starting in 2014 is unconstitutional.

U.S. District Judge Roger Vinson's widely anticipated decision is the second by a federal court in as many months challenging a key pillar of the health care law that the president signed last March. In separate lawsuits, two other federal courts have ruled that the law and its insurance mandate are permissible under the so-called Commerce Clause of the Constitution.

## Huntsman to quit ambassador role

CHICAGO (MCT) — Amid heightened speculation that he may challenge President Barack Obama in 2012, the White House confirmed Monday that Jon Huntsman will leave his post as ambassador to China in the coming months.

Press secretary Robert Gibbs said Huntsman, the Republican former governor of Utah, has told administration officials that he "plans to leave during the first part of this year."

White House staff had no information about his plans, but Huntsman still has Obama's confidence, Gibbs said. As he arrived for the state dinner, Huntsman told reporters he was "loyal to our president and our country."

## Anti-aircraft gun kills 17 civilians

MOGADISHU, Somalia (MCT) — At least 17 civilians were killed and 56 injured in the Somali capital of Mogadishu on Monday when a soldier fired an anti-aircraft gun into a crowd, witnesses and officials said.

Soldiers had killed a plainclothes policeman, triggering a tense standoff as his heavily armed colleagues came to confront the troops. A soldier then fired the anti-aircraft gun mounted atop a truck, although it was not clear if it was accidental or intentional. Witness Solomon Abdirahshid told the German news agency that dozens of people were cut to pieces as high-caliber bullets ripped through the crowd.
