Historic Varsity Theatre to reopen

The Varsity Theatre is set to reopen in late November under new management. Chapel Hill residents Paul and Susan Shreshian are the new owners.

“We believe the Varsity is a historic landmark in Chapel Hill, and we were sad when we heard it was closing,” Susan Shreshian said. “We decided we would reopen it and take it back to a time where movie going was a destination.”

Former owner Bruce Stone closed the Franklin Street mainstay this summer due to declining ticket sales.

The Varsity will show recently released and classic movies and all tickets will be \$3.

“Classic movies mean different things to different people, depending on your age and generation, so we will have a variety,” Shreshian said. She mentioned classics such as *Gone with the Wind* or John Hughes’ movies and also Saturday morning cartoons.

Renovations are underway and there is a plan to add a room for children’s birthday parties. Shreshian said the plan is to open Thanksgiving weekend.

UNC football game details

The town is hosting a feedback session this Saturday from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. in Room 110 of Town Hall.

Staff will be on hand to share information about the inventory and other climate action initiatives and to obtain feedback from community members on the type and magnitude of reduction strategies they find of interest.

Oct. 24 also has been designated by 350.org as the International Day of Climate Action.

F. Sherwood Rowland’s best-known work is the discovery that chlorofluorocarbons (CFCs) and other man-made gases contribute to the destruction of the stratospheric ozone layer that protects living organisms from damaging UV solar radiation. Because of these findings, CFC-based aerosols have been banned in the United States since 1978, and for all uses in the industrialized world since 1996. Dr. Rowland was awarded the 1995 Nobel prize in Chemistry for this pioneering research.
