'What is Internet?' poster canned

n NBC employee has been fired for posting 17-year-old footage from the "Today" show, the network confirmed.

In the 1994 clip, which made its rounds on the Internet last week, Katie Couric, Bryant Gumbel and Elizabeth Vargas try to figure out e-mail and debate the meaning of the "at" sign - or "that little mark with the 'a' and the ring around it," as Gumbel puts it.

At one point, he asks confusedly, "What is Internet, anyway?"

NBC said this wasn't the first incident involving the employee. In a statement, the network said the person had been fired for "repeatedly copying and distributing a variety of materials without permission."

NOTED. A Japanese condom company confirmed 85,000 boxes of its rubbers were stolen in Malaysia.

The boxes were being shipped from a factory to a port, where they'd be delivered to Japan, said Sagami Rubber Industries Co.

The thieves stole 725,000 individual condoms worth about \$1.5 million.

Malaysian police are investigating the theft.
