January 27, 1953, Death of my Beloved, or Part the Fourth, the Last

I would keep you out, however, so that I could talk to you and, perhaps, entice you to stay. We would play lovely games, you and I. If you are not the wind, but be on it, my beloved, do let it blow you my way. One flash of your captivating smile, and I don't believe even the wind could resist listening to your words.

Now you shall be able to fly. And darling, in all your pleasing glory, please do not forget the old man here that loves you. Do not forget to say hello once in a while.

Hand in pocket, new found "kindness" shameless compassion and ready cash.



As a nation of free men we will live forever or die by suicide. Over 51,000 Americans were killed, wounded or missing at Gettysburg Pennsylvania, and over 58,000 Americans died during the entire Vietnam War. What does this tell us?

That Americans are pretty good at killing each other.

When Americans realize we are all Americans and that all American lives are valuable regardless of who these Americans are

White people make up roughly 62 percent of the U.S. population but only about 49 percent of those who are killed by police officers. African Americans, however, account for 24 percent of those fatally shot and killed by the police despite being just 13 percent of the U.S. population. As The Post noted in a new analysis, that means black Americans are 2.5 times as likely as white Americans to be shot and killed by police officers.


