New Student Orientation Guide

Planning is necessary for registration

Looking ahead makes registering for classes a much smoother process.

Registering for your first semester at UNC can be a daunting task. But new students have access to many resources as soon as they set foot on campus.

The guides and publications from the Office of the University Registrar are available to help students as they register for their first-semester classes.

"The packet this year is going to include all information for orientation that you are seeking," said Barbara Lucido, assistant dean for the academic

advising there," she said.

Lucido said she recommends students familiarize themselves with the Connect Carolina website.

"We want them to be familiar with the information so that when we do have time to meet with them at orientation, it's not totally new and it's info they can use to help them with their fall schedule," she said.

Junior Sealy Cross said students should not expect to get their ideal schedule.

Cross said to look for classes that meet more than one general education requirement.

"Have a lot of backup options," Cross said. She said it's best to plan several schedules rather than selecting random classes.

> "Go ahead and take 12 to 15 hours and see what you can do and take time to adjust to the transition," Kang said.

However, he said students shouldn't let others talk them out of taking classes they're interested in. "Different classes are hard

for different people," Kang said. "People can talk about which professors are easy, but people are just different at the end of the day." Freshman Vivian Cheng said

websites such as http://blinkness. com and http://ratemyprofessor. com can be helpful when looking up class sections, but said they should be used with caution.

Students and administrators said the biggest and best advice is not to stress too much over registration.

Kang said if students don't get their first choice for classes during registration, they can email professors, sit in on classes and use the add/drop period. "Normally I tell my students

that registration at orientation is not the final stop," he said.


