2017 WEST END POETRY FESTIVAL

Sponsored by the Town of Carrboro & Coordinated by the *Carrboro Poets Council*

Wednesday, October 18th - Saturday, October 21st

The annual West End Poetry Festival expands to 4 days in 2017, adding a free reception and film showing on Wednesday evening and curated open mics and a jazz showcase Thursday night.

All events are free and open to the public culminating Saturday at the Century Center in downtown Carrboro, beginning with an open reading at noon by former Piedmont Poet Laureate Jaki Shelton Green and ending with an free reception Saturday night and a reading by featured poet Eduardo Corral. Eduardo is the first Latinx poet to receive The Yale Younger Poets Prize and his poem-in-process was recently featured on the cover of The New York Times Book Review.

"The West End Poetry Festival brings together nationally known poets as well as emerging voices," says Celisa Steele, former Carrboro Poet Laureate. She and current poet laureate Gary Phillips will also read during the Festival.

Time creeps in the coves,

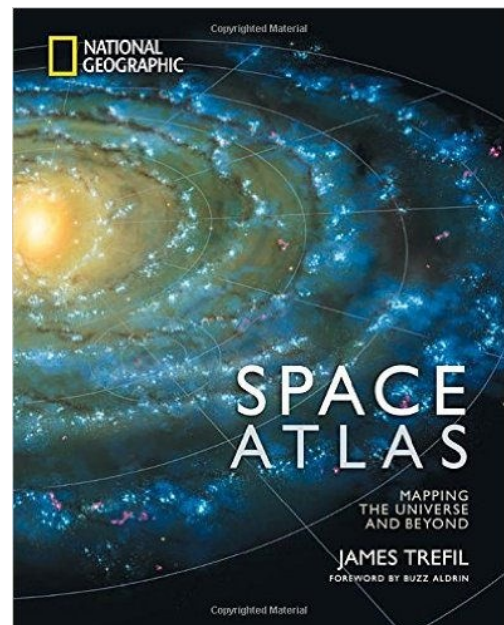
The painful beauty,

deflecting foes I cannot even see.*

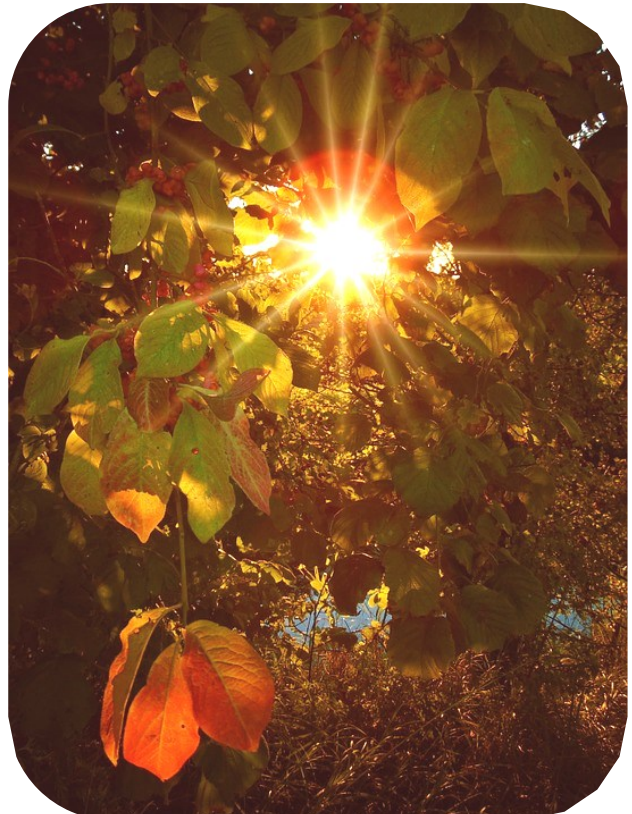

The Individual World Poetry Slam brings together elite competitive performance poets from countries all over the globe, including the United States, Canada, France, Germany, and France. In this competition, poets compete in preliminary competitions (referred to as "bouts") over two nights. The top performers from those days move on to Finals, where one poet is crowned iWPS champion!

The top fourteen poets from two nights of preliminary bouts compete in Finals. Finals consist of three 3-minute rounds. Poets cumulative scores from preliminary bouts are reset. The top seven poets in round 1 advance to round 2, and the top four poets from round 2 advance to the final round. Poets are not allowed to repeat poems through the entire competition, including finals.

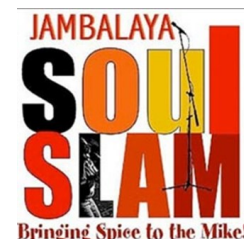

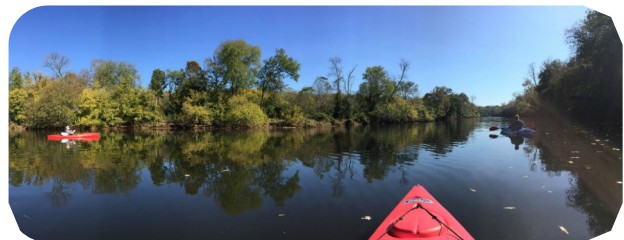

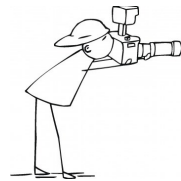
