Vaccination clinics offered

Orange County’s Animal Services Department is offering \$5 rabies vaccination clinics in October and November to ensure that cats and dogs are current on their vaccinations.

The low-cost rabies vaccination clinics are Friday, Oct. 30, from noon to 5 p.m. at the Orange County Animal Services Center, 1601 Eubanks Road, Chapel Hill, for one-year vaccinations only, and Saturday, Nov. 7, from 1 to 2 p.m. at the Government Services Center Annex, 208 S. Cameron St., Hillsborough, for both one-year and three-year vaccinations.

Fees must be paid in cash. If you’re seeking a three-year vaccination, be sure to bring your pet’s most recent vaccination certificate. Dogs must be on leashes and cats must be in carriers. Animals that may be nervous or unsettled should be kept in a vehicle for vaccination. Call 942- 7387 for more information about the clinic.

Over a short period of time, three elderly women, each one arriving home around dusk with arms filled with groceries while trying to get her key in the door, had a blanket thrown over her head and was raped.

“Ironically, one had been a professor in New York and had moved here to be safe,” Slifkin said. “It really got me upset, but I still didn’t know what to do.” Women all over town were fired

up, and as she and Elaine Hilberman, a psychologist, were en route to a meeting, she learned that sexual trauma was the root of many of Hilberman’s female clients’ problems. Slifkin asked Hilberman to speak at the next NOW meeting, which received advance notice in the newspaper.

“Most of our meetings were small ... at this one all the space and chairs were taken,” Slifkin said while looking around the area that had filled with close to 50 women. Slifkin passed around a clipboard asking women inter-

ested in starting a rape crisis center to sign up. “About 10 people did and one volunteered to be chair because she had been attacked from behind and raped by two men.”

The following year, in 1974, the center had a phone, the support of the local police departments (though resistance had been met, with one police chief telling Slifkin to “get out of my office and don’t show your face again”) and the support of the community, which remains strong.

OCRCC moved into its third

location this past summer, in offices on the third floor of 1506 E. Franklin St., where natural light from towering windows, some of which, like Slifkin’s home, open into the trees, lift and energize staff, clients and board members. Hannah Adams now serves as executive director and looks forward to the center’s 22nd annual Holiday Auction at 5 p.m. on Nov. 8 at the Chapel Hill Sheraton.

“I’m really excited,” Adams said. “So many people are involved in it, supporting it from the community. I look forward

to meeting more people at the event who support our work.”

Adams said that private donations and gifts support 50 percent of programs like Community Education – where age-appropriate education is provided to every elementary school classroom in the Orange County and Chapel Hill-Carrboro school districts – survivor services utilizing many OCRCC-trained volunteers responding to a 24-hour hotline and many other services.

Besides the auction dinner, where hundreds of exciting items will be offered in silent and live

auctions, raffle tickets are available for anyone to purchase. “A Night on the Town” includes cocktails at The Crunkleton, dinner for two with wine pairings at Bonne Soiree and a night at The Franklin Hotel. Tickets are \$5 each or 10 for \$45. The deadline to purchase tickets (\$60 each) to the auction dinner is Nov. 2. For details see OCRCC.org or call 968-4647.
