Lowery talk

Harvard University assistant professor of history Malinda Maynor Lowery will discuss "Indians, Southerners and Americans: Race Tribe and Nation During Jim Crow" on Jan. 20 at 4 p.m. at the George Watts Hill Alumni Center at UNC.

The talk will focus on the North Carolina Lumbee community, examining American Indian identity and federal policy during the Jim Crow era. 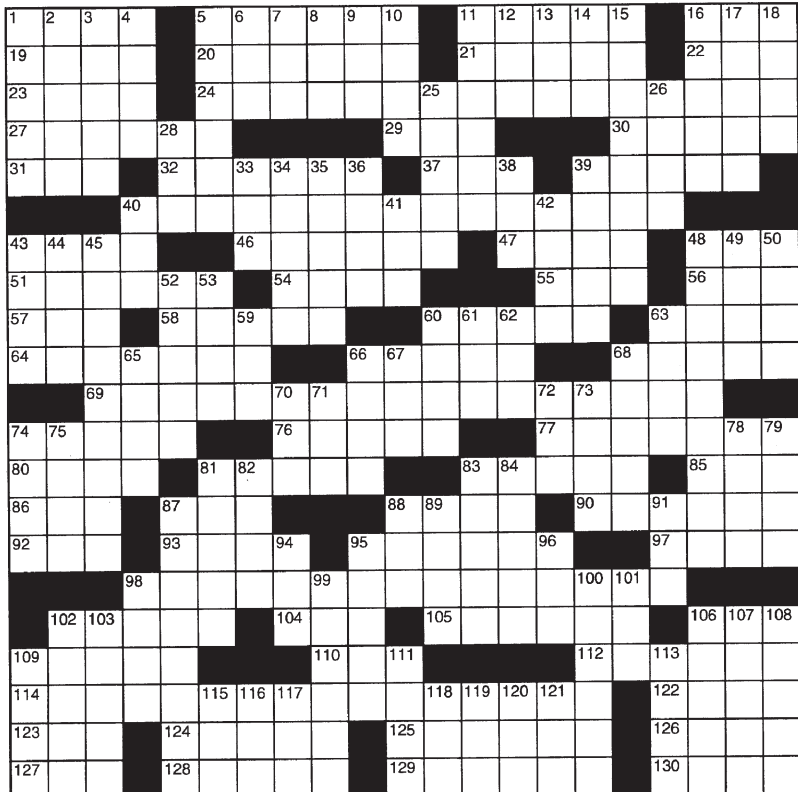
